On Sunday, April 9, 1989 at 4pm, in the evening. The members of the Allen Temple CME Church, pastored by Rev. Phillip Nelson, presented Mrs. Peggy Houston Shivers in a gala concert.

Mrs. Shivers is a world renowned lyric soprano who began her formal studies in vocal music here in Portland under the instruction of Bruce and Paula Marvin at the Marvin Studio of Voice. She attended Portland State University, where she received her degree in Education and later received a Master's in Guidance and Counseling from Ball State University, Muncie, Indiana.

Mrs. Shivers' travels and musical achievements are vast. She has performed with the San Francisco Opera Ring's Production and Concert Quartet, she was accepted into the "Escuela Superior de Canto," a conservatory of music in Madrid, Spain, she performed on Spanish television and National Radio Network, the United States Bicentennial celebration in Madrid -- in concert at the United States Cultural Center under the auspices of the United States Embassy, appeared with the Colorado Springs Symphony Orchestra and received glowing reviews.

Peggy Houston Shivers is the wife of Lt. Col. Clarence Shivers who is an internationally known artist commissioned to do an eight foot statue of the Tuskegee Airmen placed on the grounds of the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

Peggy is the daughter of Lirlean Cash Anderson; the sister to Hilda and Robert Buckley and Portland Police Officer Larry Anderson and Renee Anderson and Phyllis; the aunt of Hildonne, Robert, Christopher, Cash, Lirlean and Emanuel and she is a niece of Garfield and Betty Cash. She has one son, Hugh B. Flake, II.

Sunday's performance allowed us to travel to France, Germany, Italy and Spain; then, we came back home with down home gospel and Negro spirituals. She included the audience in two of her songs.

Due to the change of climate, Peggy was not in her rare form--but everyone in attendance thoroughly enjoyed her performance. With the cold or without the cold. Her closing number "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory", with the audience as the choir, was magnificently done.

Daniel J. and Elizabeth O. Cohn Lecture

Guest Speaker:
Congressman John Lewis

U.S. Rep. John Lewis of Georgia, called by Time magazine "a living saint", will deliver the annual Daniel and Elizabeth Cohn Lecture at Temple Beth Israel on Friday, April 14, at 7:30 pm. Lewis, former head of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and one of the "Big Six" of the civil rights movement, will speak on Black-Jewish relations today.

One of 10 children of a sharecropper, Lewis became active in the civil rights movement as a college student at the beginning of the 1960's. At 19, he helped organize the first lunch-counter sit-ins, and in 1961 was brutally beaten on Freedom Rides in South Carolina and Alabama. In 1963, he became head of SNCC, and spoke at the March on Washington along with Martin Luther King, Jr.

The next year, he helped organize Mississippi Freedom Summer, recently depicted in the controversial film "Mississippi Burning", and in 1965 led the Selma-to-Montgomery march for voting rights, where he was attacked by police with clubs, whips and tear gas. During his leadership of the movement, Lewis was jailed 40 times. "Probably none has paid a higher price to change this country," wrote Washington Post columnist David Broder, "than John Lewis."

Lewis later served as associate head of ACTION, the domestic Peace Corps, in the Carter administration, and in 1982 was elected to the Atlanta City Council. On the council, he built political ties to both black and white communities that enabled him to defeat Julian Bond for Atlanta's seat in Congress in 1986.

In Congress, Lewis has been elected an At-Large Majority Whip and a member of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, and serves on the Congressional Coalition on Soviet Jewry.

Lewis' prominence over the last 30 years puts him in a unique position to discuss the relations between America's Jewish and black communities, closely allied at the beginning of the movement and suffering well-reported strains in the years since.

"We have lost some of our finest leaders, but we are still very involved in that struggle for liberation," said Lewis last year, receiving an honorary doctorate from Williams College. "Our struggle is not for one day, or one week, or one year, but for a lifetime if that's what it takes."

Lewis will speak directly after services at Temple Beth Israel, 1931 NW Flanders. Admission is FREE.

IN LOVING MEMORY OF PEARL CLARK CLOW

Funeral services were held on Monday, April 10, 1989 at the Mt. Olivet Baptist Church for Mrs. Pearl Clark Clow. She was 93 years old. She passed on Wednesday, April 5, 1989 in a Portland hospital.

She was born in Virginia in December 26, 1895.

Mrs. Clow has always been active in the church and the community. She came to Portland 50 years ago. She attended Virginia Union University and, after moving to Portland, she continued her education and graduated from University of Oregon.

Pearl Clark Clow was the wife of the late Rev. Dr. Jessie James Clow. Rev. Clow served 27 years as the pastor of Mt. Olivet Baptist Church. He retired in 1963. Rev. John H. Jackson filled the pulpit following his retirement.

Mrs. Clow became a member of the Highland Baptist Church, pastored by Rev. Ormond; and, she continued her membership and ties with both churches until her death.

Mrs. Clow became active in many early civil rights women's organizations to bring about de-segregation in the state of Oregon. She, along with 10 other women, staged sit-ins and demonstrations attempting to change the separation between races, here in Portland. She served as president of the Church Women United of Portland, secretary of the Portland Council of Churches, Church Women United of Oregon, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, secretary of the board of directors of the Downtown Center YWCA, a board member of the board of directors of the Portland Federation of Women's Organization and the American Association of University Women.
