

### Sabin School's Writing Festival Celebrates Words, Words, Words

Sabin Elementary next week (May 8-12) celebrates written, spoken and performed words, words and words.

The annual Sabin Writing Festival at 4013 N.E. 18th Ave. features students sharing their writings, older students revealing literary efforts and a storyteller of ancient myths.

On Monday (May 8) at 11 a.m. Jefferson High's theatre company performs "Three African Folk Tales" for students in Grades 3-5.

On Tuesday (May 9) storyteller Dave Barrett from Young Audiences will captivate prekindergarten and kindergarten students at 9 a.m. and students in grades 2 and 4 at 10 a.m. with the folktale, "Undersea Journeys."

At 11 a.m. the same day, students in Grades 3 and 5 will hear Barrett tell a collection of Northwest Indian tales titled "Northwest Mytime." On Wednesday (May 10) parents and other members of the community will view writing efforts of Sabin students in halls, classrooms and other school areas during an open house from 7 - 8:30 p.m.

On Friday (May 12) students gather at 1:45 p.m. for a 30-minute all-school assembly celebrating writing.

Missing from the celebration is the school's annual balloon launch disseminating student writings because helium-filled balloons may have negative impacts on the environment and wildlife.

An alternative "publishing" of student works features exchanges of student writings among schools across the state.

Pacific N.W. Clinical Research Center is one of several sites selected to receive grants in a national research effort to conduct federally-approved clinical trials in the treatment of moderate memory loss. Each eligible, medically-stable patient will be enrolled in at least one placebo-controlled medication trial.

If you are caring for someone 45-85 years old, who is having memory loss and/or gradual mental deterioration, you may be able to help him or her participate in this research study. The memory loss may or may not be due to Alzheimer's disease, but it must not be caused by cardiovascular disease, stroke, head injury, brain tumor, substance abuse, or depression.

You may be eligible for a research study if you are 21 to 65 and suffer from anxiety, worry, nervousness, inner tension and physical symptoms of stress (headaches, sweating, dry mouth, pounding heart, etc.)

If you meet the criteria for generalized anxiety disorder without a seriously depressed mood, you may receive free screening and medical treatment for up to two months. Individuals with alcohol or drug abuse, or poorly controlled medical problems cannot be accepted for this research. Females must be sterile or post-menopausal.
