chance soon to express something about our State. Rather than telling the rest of the world that our state flower is the Oregon Grape or that our state shoelace is exactly sixtytwo and one-quarter inches long. we have an opportunity to let everyone know who we are--what principles weembrace, what qualities we value, what truths we uphold.

We can achieve just that through Senate passage of House Bill 2705, which would establish a legal school holiday the third Monday of January each year in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The State House of Representatives passed House Bill 2705 on June 13, establishing the holiday and putting us just one step away from achieving what has been for some a dream deferred. Senate passage and subsequent signature into law by Governor Goldschmidt will bring this dream to fruition and say something about Oregon that will rise above the cacophony which accompanied the close of the legisla-

It will say that we, as Oregonians, stand together against racism. That we believe in equality. That we believe in the qualities that Dr. King embodied, and we want our young

Oregonians will have an excellent people to emulate the kind of man a citizen is murdered simply because that Dr. King was--to live the kind of he is black, when other citizens are life that he lived. That Oregonians believe in the non-violent fight for what is right, even as an oppressed minority against overwhelming odds, even when it means denying oneself the comforts of the status quo, even when it is hard and we are tired, even when we must sacrifice everything, even unto death. Passage of this bill will tell our children that it is right to fight for a better humanity.

In a time when the South was rife with racism and hatred, Dr. King lived a story of peace. He did not strike back against those who tried to beat him down. He did not hate Southern whites in return of their hatred for him. He did not bomb a white church or murder white children in response to the bombing and murder of children in a black church. Instead, he refused to participate in the violence which was inherent in the system. When Rosa Parks could not ride in the front of a bus, rather than becoming violent, Dr. King organized a boycott of that bus line. He lived as a victim of the violence, the hatred, and the humiliation of discrimination and yet he responded with non-violence and love.

In a time when Oregon is experiencing a resurgence of racism, when

attacked simply for being members of an ethnic minority, it is time for us to apply the lessons of Dr. King. We cannot violate his dream by attacking racist organizations and forming hate groups of our own. We must continue to live his dream, and to affirm it with non-violent protest and caring. The fate of House Bill 2705 will say something important about Oregonians, one way or the other. I urge all concerned to write or call


