PACIFIC POWER TO TEST NEW METER

A sophisticated electronic meter soon to be tested by 30 Portland families is Pacific Power's first step toward delivering Twenty-First Century service to its customers.

The meter is designed to collect and periodically transfer energy use data through either telephone lines or satellite dishes to a computer. The central computer will maintain records on customer usage and perform automated billing tasks.

In addition, numerous special services, such as home shopping, automated banking and home security monitoring can be offered to customers through the meter.

Pay-per-view television broadcasts of special events, such as athletic tournaments not available through traditional or cable stations, also may be possible.

"The automated meter, if feasible, would reduce the company's cost of providing reliable service, a benefit that we would pass on in the form of lower customer prices," said Joe Barra, Pacific's new products director.

"It also would eliminate the need for home and business meter reading, and clear the way for Pacific to offer new energy-related services to customers," he said.

The units will be connected near the employee's existing meter, and test will focus on reliability and viability of the technology. Later testing may include various energy services.

If the initial pilot is successful, and additional 100 units will be installed at test sites throughout the company's service area by year end. The units will remain in place for one year.

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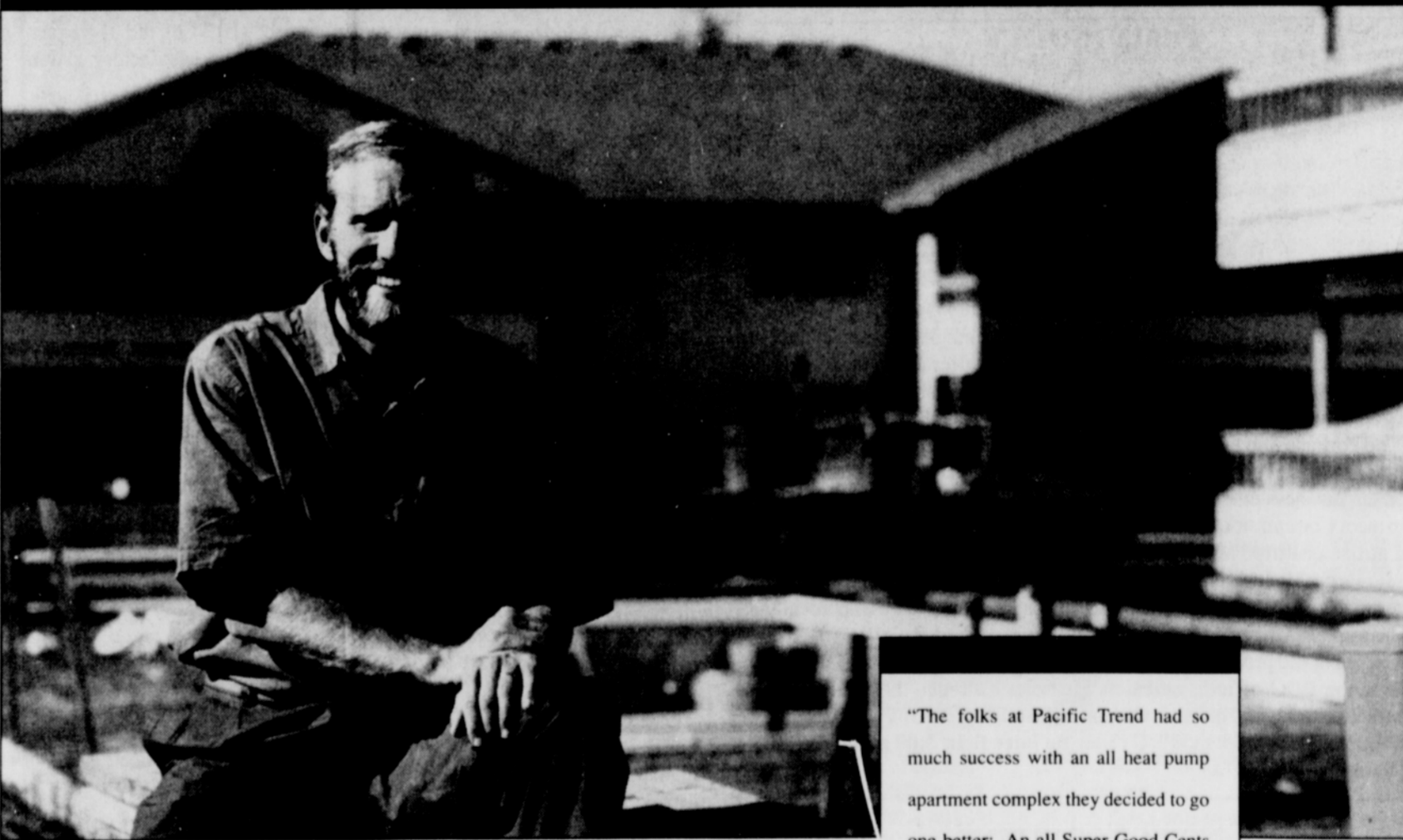

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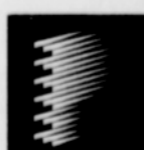
