SOMEONE SPECIAL IS WAITING

One-year-old Eddie is fairly light in color and has black eyes and black hair. He is a happy baby and has a wonderful smile which lights up his whole face. He is intent on exploring his universe.

Eddie likes to be the center of attention and responds to attention from adults. Eddie does not seem to have any identifiable fears. He does, however, like to ride in the car; to be held, especially when taking a bottle; and to play with others (as the center of attention). He likes toys which make a lot of noise; he also likes to sit in his chair outside. Eddie's favorite toy is his hobby horse.

Eddie is a restless sleeper (he wakes up two to three times a night). He usually wakes up laughing in the morning and from nap time. He likes vegetables. His favorites are squash, carrots, sweet potatoes--almost anything with a yellow-orange color. He will eat green beans, but they are not a favorite; he will not eat peas. He likes rice cereal with bananas--they are his favorite fruit.

Eddie can fit into almost any home (single parent, older siblings, no siblings, etc). The adoptive family would need to be one who can keep up with the demands of an active, growing toddler and would be able to provide the opportunities and challenges necessary to help Eddie grow into a healthy, young adult. The family also would need to be committed to seeking any therapy or medical assistance Eddie may require as he grows.

'LEAD WAR ON DRUGS,' BISHOP URGES CHURCH

A "moral and spiritual" dimension, led by the religious community, was called for Sept.6 by the United Methodist bishop spearheading his church's part in the nation's war on drugs.

Bishop Felton E. May of Harrisburg, Pa., said President Bush, in his Sept. 5 address to the nation, "offered a political solution to what is a spiritual and moral dilemma." United Methodist, the bishop said, "must actualize, manifest and demonstrate our love for God and our love for neighbor, or we will perish."

Bishop May told United Methodist News Service: "I felt more convinced than ever that the church ... cannot wait for the government to offer political solutions.

CHURCHES JOIN IN AIDS INFORMATION PROGRAM FOR MISSIONARIES

An education program to alert missionaries to the potential dangers of aids has been launched by the National Council of Churches with the cooperation of five member denominations in the United States and the United Church of Canada.

Missionaries as a group tend to be at low risk for AIDS, NCC officials said, because generally they are not homosexual, intravenous drug users or sexually promiscuous. In emergency situations requiring blood transfusions or injections of medicine, however, the risk of AIDS increases dramatically, according to Dr. John

Frame, director of an NCC-related health office here. Six AIDS infections are known among the 40,000 North American Protestant missionaries in other countries, Dr. Frame said, but none of the six is from a NCC member church.

Dr. Duvon Corbitt, medical secretary of the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries, told a Religious News Service reporter that "it would be foolhardy to go out and not take care of yourself." The board is participating in the education program, he said, because "We have a total responsibility for people we send out."



CHURCHES URGED TO HELP CREATE 'DRUG-FREE' AREAS

Churches here are being urged by a United Methodist pastor and other religious leaders to establish four-block, "drug-free" zones around their property to fight crack cocaine.

The Rev. Patrick Williams, regional coordinator of an anti-drug national network, is spearheading the effort. One part of the effort will be a conference Sept.22-23 at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. Mr. Williams, and others in Dallas, also are working to persuade the Texas Drug and Alcohol Commission to fund a serious study of the crack problem.

STRENGTHENING OF BLACK CHURCHES SOUGHT

Plans for strengthening black United Methodist churches in eight states are being formulated under sponsorship of the denomination's South Central Jurisdiction.

"Beyond Survival" has been adopted as the overall theme of the networking project. The project was initiated after a survey in the states of Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Kansas, Arkansas and Missouri.

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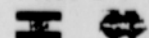
