Anti-Drug Act Funds Awarded The Tri-County Region

Governor Neil Goldschmidt yesterday announced the awarding of \$172,000 in drug enforcement funds to the Regional Organized Crime Narcotics Task Force ("ROCN") for 1989-90.

The funds are part of the \$1.5 million that the State of Oregon received under the federal 1988 Anti-Drug Abuse Act. Those funds are being distributed consistent with the state's 1989 Law Enforcement Drug and Violent Crime Strategy that was developed after a series of statewide community hearings this past summer.

Michael D. Schrunk, Multnomah County District Attorney and Chairman of the ROCN Control Board, welcomed the Governor's news. "These funds will enable the Task Force to effectively target. its day-to-day investigations and prosecutions. Illegal drug activity ignores the political boundaries of any area, so it is essential that law enforcement authorities coordinate their work. Money is always a great incentive to bringing people together, and these state funds are being used precisely as they shoull be -- leveraging scarce dollars to produce large results."

During the last year, the Anti-Drug Act funds previously awarded to ROCN resulted in:

- * Execution of 33 search warrants and 30 arrests.
- 13 federal prosecutions.
- 13 state prosecutions.
- Seizures ofdrugs valued at \$2,077,510.
- Seizures of currency amounting to \$246,080.
- Seizures of 19 vehicles.
- Seizures of 64 weapons.

The ROCN Task Force is one of seven Regional Anti-Drug Enforcement task forces in the state. They were created to pool together scarce law enforcement resources in the multicounty area and target specific illegal drug activity for investigation, apprehension and prosecution. The work of the Task Force is coordinated by a ROCN Control Board which is made up of the following indi-

A target area will be canvasseddoor to door beginning November 4th, but all residents of Kenton Neighborhood who meet the income guidelines are eligible to apply for the FREE weatherization program at the Energy Fair.

Also at the Energy Fair participants who meet the income guidelines will receive a certificate for FREE do it yourself weatherization materials. So come to the Energy Fair which again is being held November 18, 1989 at the Kenton Fire House.

The Block-By-Block Weatherization Project is a City of Portland project paid for by the city and Portland General Electric, Northwest Natural Gas, Pacific Power and Light and the Oregon Department of Energy. 

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PDC's OREGON CONVENTION CENTER RECEIVES AWARD

The Portland Development Commission (PDC) has received a Special Achievement Award from the International Downtown Association (IDA) for the Oregon Convention Center Area Development Strategy.

IDA presented the award to PDC in the category of planning and development, describing the Oregon Convention Center Area Development Strategy as "an excellent example of development which carries out the intention of a city comprehensive plan." The Strategy was termed a logical outrgrowth of a 1986 regional decision to build the Oregon Convention Center and the 1988 adoption of the Central City Plan. PDC originally prepared a draft Strategy under contract to the Metropolitan Service Distrct. Formal adoption of the Development Strategy Policies and Procedures occurred in December 1988.

Further, IDA states that the Strategy establishes "clear priorities, a funding plan and a process to develop a visitor and pedestrain focus for the Oregon Convention Center area, extend the downtown core across the Willamette River and establish a long-term development strategy for public/private investment in an area physically removed from the central business district."

Ruth Scott, Executive Director of the Association for Portland Progress, accepted the award on behalf of PDC at IDA's conference in Memphis on September 25,1989.
