United Way Funds Planning Process for American Indian Organization

The Portland American Indian community will have an opportunity to watch and participate as the AIAP Board of Directors begins a nine-month planning process to secure services to urban Indians lost through the fragmentation of major multi-service Indian organizations. The American Indian Association of Portland (AIAP), an "organization of Indian organizations," has existed in the Portland community for several years and, in the past, provided an open forum for Indian issues.

PORTLAND IMPACT, a multi-cultural/multi-service agency was awarded a \$25,000 United Way grant in June to fund this planning process. Christine Lowery (Hopi/Laguna), a social worker with community organizing skills, was hired Oct. 9 to coordinate the activities of the AIAP Board. The primary goal is to develop a summary and fund raising plan. Funds will also be used to provide public relations material such as an AIAP brochure and a "communication tool for the Indian community."

The American Indian Association of Portland is housed by PORTLAND IMPACT at 4707 S.E. Hawthorne, 97215. PORTLAND IMPACT also sponsors the Indian elders group, Pi Nee Waus.

Currently represented on the AIAP Board of Directors are Title V Indian Education, Oregon Commission on Indian Services, NW Indian Child Welfare Association, Concerned Indian Community, Church of the Four Winds, JTPA Confederated Tribes of Siletz, Portland Impact, Aging Minority Task Force, Native American Rehabilitation Association (NARA), Pi Nee Waus, and the Indian community-at-large.

Board recruitment is now in progress, with board training in the planning stages. Individual association memberships, Indian organization memberships, and non-Indian individual and organizational memberships are available. For more information contact Christine Lowery, (503) 233-5000.

Crime To Be Discussed On Sunday Northwest

Join host Rick Meyers this week in an interview with Fred Pearce, Director/Oregon Department of Corrections, and Bob Skipper, Multnomah County Sheriff, on Sunday Northwest, Sunday morning November 5, at 9:00 a.m.

Topics to be discussed include prison overcrowding, expansion of Inverness Jail, and the proposed 40 million dollar ballot measure for jail expansion. In addition, new sentencing guidelines (effective Nov. 1), the issue of prevention versus intervention, and the unprecedented flow of criminal activity in Oregon will be examined.

Both Skipper and Pearce believe that Oregon is perceived by the rest of the nation as being soft on criminals, and that Oregon should get tougher on crime.

 - 1 - Can small shrimp (sizes vary - 4 to 4-1/2 oz.)
 - 1 - 6 oz. can crab
 - 5 tbsps. Miracle Whip
 - 2 - Green Onions chopped (optional)
 - 1 - Stalk Celery finely chopped (optional)

Astrophysicist Philip Morrison is in Portland, Friday, November 17th to present a lecture/slide show at the Portland Civic Auditorium. Dr. Morrison's presentation is titled "The Cosmic Drama in Two Acts: Newton and Anti-Newton," and runs from 7:30-9:30 p.m., including an extended Q&A period. Tickets are available through G.I. Philip Morrison is more than just an extraordinary astrophysicist. Professor at prestigious Massachusetts Institute of Technology, book reviewer for Scientific American and author of countless books and articles, he is also a gifted teacher. Says Carl Sagan, "The people who attend his lectures never forget them." Morrison is the author and host of the six part PBS series "The Ring of Truth."

Morrison made some of his most significant scientific contributions examining two fascinating and fundamental questions about cosmic rays: Where do they come from and how are they made? He and colleague Giuseppe Cocconi published a paper that grew into the field of study known as the Search for Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence (SETI).

He was associated from the start with the innovative Physical Science Study Committee (PSSC) and became co-author of its novel secondary-school text. In recent years, his wife Phylis, a teacher of science and art, has been his collaborator on many of his projects. In 1980, with four Boston area colleagues, they published The Price of Defense: A New Strategy for Military Spending. Their book of images, Powers of Ten, was published in 1982.

Monica Little, member of the Portland Community College board of directors, and Dr. E. Paul Williams, executive dean of the PCC Sylvania Campus, will take part in the program of the Western Region Council on Black American Affairs conference November 2-4 in Oakland, Cal.

Dr. Williams will be moderator and Ms. Little will be a panelist in a workshop tentatively titled "Governing Boards: A Key to African-American Success in Community Colleges."

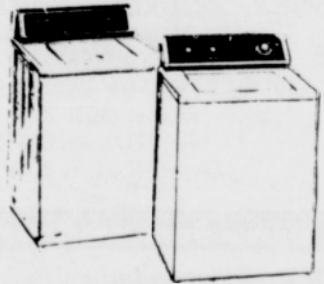
