PSU EXTENDS ADMISSIONS OPENS REGISTRATION

Portland State University has announced extension of the deadline for formal admission to the University this fall from July 1 to August 1 and, in addition, is removing previous restrictions on advance registration for non-admitted students. That means prospective students have an additional month to apply for admission to PSU and, even prior to the granting of admission, they can register for fall classes.

A decision by the State Board of Higher Education on June 14 eliminated an enrollment limitation at PSU for the coming year. As a result of the limit, Portland State last year reduced it's enrollment by nearly 1,200 students (7.4

"Removal of the enrollment lid at Portland State is good news for the metropolitan area, "Interim President Roger Edgington said. "it means the University is once again free to serve the higher education needs of the state's population center.Last year we were forced to turn students away. That will not happen this year," he said.

Because of the timing of the Board's decision, the University has taken the step of extending its admissions deadline for a month as well as relaxing restrictions on advance registration, also imposed as part of last year's mandated plan to reduce enrollment.

Edgington said he was concerned that recent high school graduates and others who are thinking about starting their university studies may have thought it was too late to register or gain admission to the University. "What we want to say to those people, "he said, "is that it is not too late. Our Admissions Office (Lobby of Neuberger Hall, SW Broadway between Harrison and Hall) will be open Monday through Friday. Admissions personnel will accept applications for admission through Wednesday, August 1, and advanced registration materials through Friday, August 31."

In addition, Portland State will hold its annual Freshman Orientation sessions July 28 through August 11. Prospective students may choose from weekday or Saturday sessions during which they will receive academic advising and assistance with Fall Term registration as well as information about the University and student life and services. Information about Freshman Orientation is available from the University's Advising Office, also in the Lobby of Neuberger Hall (725-4563).

Portland State University is the state's comprehensive urban university with more than 30 academic majors and programs within the main College of Liberal Arts and Science, as well as seven professional schools. The University awards more than 2,000 graduate and undergraduate degrees each year.

(1970)

In 1984 on a prison yard in Salem, Oregon, a devine message was given to Donald McMillan and with that message a devine mission to establish a haven where men released from prison wouldn't be subjected to returning to the community without housing, food, support.

With a handful of men who recognized the dream, the articles for incorporation were developed for creation of the non-profit self-help group Inside Outside People.

Don's mission was clear: he was to establish a base of support that would bridge and interconnect all other services already existing, bring together factions of the community that in times past felt no profit or interest existed for men often called career criminals, undesirables in the future of this community or any community. It was his dream to "manufacture" role models for the youth of the community from these same individuals to utilize as examples for the youth of the community, against gangs and drugs, but time was running out for Don.

He shared his dream with Tom Boothe of the American State Bank

who provided a house located at 5003 NE 13th. The House of Exodus, a much-needed program that was created by his wife Rosie Boothe who nurtured the idea that treatment should be provided for those who sought help. Needless to say Ms. Boothe died of cancer and the full potential of her dream went into dormancy, until Don McMillan and Tom Boothe re-affirmed that belief in Inside Outside People.

Don McMillan and Rosie Boothe are similar in the respect that they both dreamed and they both shared the pain of life-threatening cancer. God gave them the message, it was there divine mission to deliver it and only that. In 1986 Don McMillan died of prostrate cancer, his mission completed. He handpicked Mr. Herbert Brown and Thomas Mason to manifest the dream and once again God's mission was revialized in the efforts of these brothers to the success which has nurtured the program so far. Whether you call it Inside Outside People of Stay Clean, it's still God's program, and the dream of Don McMillan lives on at Sumner and in the hearts of us all. We thank God for Don McMillan, his dream, and the Stay Clean Inc. family.
