### **DINOS ON DISPLAY TWO MORE** WEEKS AT OMSI!

Visitors have only two weeks to their jungle-like setting. witness a prehistoric head-smashing battle between twow Pachycephalosauri at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. OMSI's all-new action-packed dinosaur exhibit, featuring 14 dinosaurs which have never been seen in Portland, will be on display through Sept. 9.

This action-packed exhibit features dinosaurs made by Kokoro Company Ltd. in Tokyo, Japan, and focuses on behaviors of present-day and prehistoric animals in a junglelike atmosphere. Visitors will also see a mother Maiasaura nurturing a nest of hatching eggs and babies; a 20-foottall Albertosaurus chasing a 20-footlong Euoplocephalus; and will learn about the fierce flesh-eating, warmblooded Deinonychus as it joins others to capture its prey. All dinosaurs move and roar and appear to come to life in

In previous years, OMSI had dinosaurs which stood alone. This year, DINO-MIGHT! includes dinosaurs in groups, acting out different behaviors. Examples of behavior patterns of present-day animals, including nesting, eating and dominant behaviors, will help visitors understand how dinosmight have acted over 100 million years ago.

Admission to DINO-MIGHT! is free after OMSI admission. Museum admission is \$5.25 for adults; \$4.25 for seniors; \$3.50 for students, age three through 17; and free for OMSI members.

The Pacific Mountain Network (PMN) is a nonprofit regional public broadcasting network owned and operated by public television stations throughout the Rocky Mountains, the Pacific Coast, Alaska, and Hawaii. PMN's activities include programming, distribution, research, promotion, training, production, and learning services.

The program committee is elected by program managers of affiliated stations. One of the major functions of the committee is to serve as a channel between local program managers and PMN and the national public broadcasting organizations. The committee also helps distribute the Program Fund, a grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, to assist member stations with production.

Doggett, who joined KOAC-TV as a television producer-director in 1965, has successively been production manager for KOAC radio and television, director of radio and television programming for Oregon Educational and Public Broadcasting Service, director of TV programming and production for Oregon Public Broadcasting, and, since 1988, vice president of television programming for OPB.
