The reunion, held from August 9-13 in Denver, brought together dozens of family members and friends from five states. While there was no set theme, issues of love and commitment to family were ever-present. John and Thelma Sylvester of Portland, themselves married for 54 years, provided the fertile ground for the flourishing family tree.

"There were a lot of things that our folks didn't own," Mrs. Sylvester told the group. "You see, we didn't have much. But we had pride."

"I hope it won't take a long time to see everybody again, because half the people could be gone. Besides," she said, "I shouldn't have to wait ten years to see my family."

During World War II she lived in Fargo, ND and worked at a fashionable retail store. When she moved to Oregon she was a homemaker and later she worked with her husband for many years in their business--the Don Herzog/H.E. Dickson income tax agency.

She continued her interest in education by teaching adults and children to read. She founded the "Reading Tree" located at Irving Park in 1971, which continues each summer and was recently expanded to Alberta and Peninsula parks. She was dedicated to the efforts of promoting literacy through phonics. She and her husband sponsored Little League Softball teams in Irving Park for many years. She was active in the Irvington Community Association, Model Cities, Coalition for School Integration, Ore-


