Why talk about prescriptions? Because studies have shown that up to half of all medicines prescribed are used incorrectly, contributing to prolonged illness, avoidable side effects, unnecessary hospitalizations and even death.


Prescription medicines should improve your condition or make you feel better. But to work, any prescription must be used properly. The National Council on Patient Information and Education; suggests the following questions be asked whenever a medicine is prescribed:

- The name of the drug and what it's supposed to do
- How and when to take it, and for how long
- What foods, drinks and other medicines or activities to avoid when taking the drug
- If there are any side effects,

and what to do if they occur • If there is any written informa tion available about the drug

The physicians's job is to make sure he/she prescribes the right medicine. But every patient has a responsibility too. You should tell your doctor:

- The names of the medicines you are now taking, including
- any non prescription drugs If you are allergic to any medi
- If you have any problems with any medicines
- If you are or could be pregnant Parents have a responsibility to ask questions about the medicines prescribed to their children, and older adults need to be aware that their bodies may react to medicines differently with age. The only way to ensure better health is to commu-
