Excerpts from HEAVEN WITHIN THESE WALLS by Rev. Glandion Carney, associate pastor of the Mt. Olivet Baptist Church, dean of Warner Pacific Bible College, author, parent, husband, world renown evangelist and missionary. The inspired words, of this book, will enlighten your hearts and rekindle the fire, of the Holy Spirit, deep within your souls.

In his classic on spirituality, Pilgrims's Progress, Puritan writer John Bunyan depicted the spiritual life as a long journey. Along the way the young pilgrim in the story encountered numerous temptations to abandon his pursuit of the Celestial City. His toughest challenge was simply to persevere in the journey.

I feel like this pilgrim most of the time. Almost daily I find myself being tempted to forsake my spiritual journey. There are always important things to do and delightful pleasures to be enjoyed. These activities may be worth-while at certain times, but often they have the negative effect of drawing my attention away from God. At other times I become comfortable with my daily routines and begin to believe my life is complete right where I am now. I really don't want to change because I might have to give up some thing I treasure. But the spiritual journey requires me to keep moving.

So like Bunyan's pilgrim, I have discovered that perseverance is the most difficult part of the journey. Indeed, the temptations may not be so formidable. They are often subtle and innocent, like

Drastic cuts in federal funding for both emergency food and housing means that the over 33,000 people living in poverty in Washington County must rely even more on emergency food boxes to feed their families. Food in those boxes must primarily come from the community-businesses, churches, social organizations and individuals. The public is being asked to bring donations of food or money to their local Safeway stores on November 10. Items most needed are tuna, peanut butter, canned meats, stews, pasta (macaroni, spaghetti), powdered milk and packaged beans, peas and lentils.



Sergeant Jeanne Bradley, a 14-year veteran of the Portland Police Bureau, has been named commander of the Sunshine Division, taking the place of longtime commander Sgt. Mike Salmon, who has retired.

As commander of the Sunshine Division, Bradley will manage a small civilian staff in conducting the Sunshine Division's emergency relief efforts. She has been a sergeant for the past eight years. She has held uninformed positions at the Police Bureau's Central Precinct and has been previously assigned to personnel, drugs and vice, crime prevention and forfeiture units.

Salmon had been commander of the Sunshine Division for 14 years and had been with the Police Bureau for 26 years.

Formed in 1923 by concerned citizens, the Sunshine Division is a volunteer agency devoted to providing temporary emergency food supplies to Portland families in need year round. The Sunshine Division also distributes thousands of food baskets to needy families at the holidays, and distributes used clothing, shoes, appliances, bedding, furniture and cooking and eating utensils when available.




