Needy Families Receive Christmas Hams Through Generous Donation From Safeway and Hormel

Some needy Portland families will receive extra holiday cheer in their Christmas baskets this season. Safeway, Inc. and Hormel have donated 90 Hormel Cure 81 hams to Oregon Food Bank. OFB will distribute the hams to several agencies serving individuals and families in North and Northeast Portland on Friday, December 21st, 10:00 a.m. at the Oregon Food Bank Warehouse (2540 N.E.
