Tight, closely coordinated scheduling permitted the Battelle scientists and staff from the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI) to carry out demonstrations in 24 topical areas of science and technology. The range was from earth sciences and biology to space and "exploring the properties of various solids, gases and liquids. There was hands on involvement by students and the response was loud and enthusiastic. The level of interest was high throughout the day and I am sure that much of the success was due to a carefully crafted grade-specific organization of the student body. Principal Paul Coakley had orchestrated the support functions to perfection. There were 24 major presentation topics in all and I will list some of them here. Quite possibly, other schools in the district will find them of interest-helpful in the design of science programs; "Being aware of the earth around you-soil chemistry-fossils-pioneering space-robotics and machine design-Geology-Marine Animals-Arid Land Ecology-Waste Management-Radiation in the environment and you-Properties of Light Environmental Toxicology-Antarctic research-Materials Science."

## Edward J. Washington Sworn In As President Of NAACP

Edward J. Washington a life-long resident of Portland, was sworn in as President of the local chapter of the NAACP on Sunday, Jan. 20, 1991.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, founded in 1909, is the oldest and largest civil rights organization in the country. The Portland chapter, chartered in 1911, is the

oldest branch west of the Mississippi and largest in the state.

Washington is a 16-year employee of U.S. West, currently working with the Government and Education Market group with account responsibility for private colleges, secondary and elementary education, and community col-

He graduated from Portland State University in 1974 in Liberal Arts and Social Sciences. He has been involved with community activities throughout his professional life, and has run for

Washington has been a member of the NAACP for more than 20 years. He said his first priority during his twoyear term "is to make sure the NAACP continues to have the credibility and visibility they have fought so hard to earn." "The Portland branch is a fighting chapter", he said. During the late '50's and early '60's we helped get blacks employed in retail and grocery stores, government offices, and helped

pass the state's fair employment act." Washington is also looking to increase the chapter's membership, currently at about 500; revitalize the activities in the chapter's division, and reach out and work closely with other organizations in the community who have similar goals.

'We shouldn't stop striving just because there are no more visible signs of discrimination," he said. "There is still racial harassment going on. We need to provide support for all people."

## **Tax Extension For Storm Soldiers**

Many of you reading this column have friends or acquaintances in the Persian Gulf. Some of you have children or grandchildren, brothers or sisters participating in Operation Desert Storm. Maybe your husband or wife is in Saudi Arabia.

The American soldiers serving in the Gulf are sacrificing themselves for our country. They left behind their jobs and their families. For those who are left behind to wait and worry, there is much to do. You need to work just that much harder to keep your families together, For our soldiers overseas, they have even more to worry and think about.

American soldiers and their families have enough on their minds now without having to worry about deadlines and demands back home. Included among those is our fast-approaching deadline for filing tax returns.

That's why along with other Senators, I introduced legislation to extend the tax filing deadline for Americans stationed in the Persian Gulf.

The legislation gives the men and women (and their spouses) up to 60 days after completing Operation Desert Storm service to file their tax returns and pay their taxes. They will not be charged interest on taxes owed, but will receive interest on refunds.

For those Americans hospitalized for injuries sustained in Desert Storm operations, the 60-day period will begin upon being released from hospitals.

The bill provides temporary relief from federal tax filings and payments. And, since Oregon follows federal tax rules, Oregonians serving in the Desert Storm operation will automatically receive an extension for Oregon tax

returns as well. Some states which do not follow federal rules will need to enact similar legislation as quickly as possible.

As the senior Republican on the Senate Finance Committee, which has jurisdiction over tax issues, I will be responsible for bringing this legislation through the Senate committee process. I hope, and expect, to have the cooperation of Congress to pass this legislation into law quickly.

American servicemen and women have made gree sacrifices, leaving behind their job: .nd their families. It will give them a :nse of relief to know the paperwork tack home will wait for their safe returr.

These men and women did not ask for a lot when they went to the Middle East to risk their lives. I think Congress owes them at least this small favor.
