OPB Radio Network To Air "World Of Islam" Series With Introductions By Peter Jennings

Because of the crisis in the Persian Gulf, global interest in Islamic culture and history is being aroused, creating a need for public education about this region of the world.

Beginning in March, Oregon Public Broadcasting radio will air NPR's "The World of Islam," an award-winning 13-week exploration of the history, culture, and future of Islam.

ABC-TV News anchor Peter Jennings introduces each of the series' halfhour presentations, offering listeners a fascinating glimpse of the social, political, cultural, and religious forces that drive the Islamic world.

The series, produced jointly by British journalist Julian Crandall Hollick, also the series narrator, and WBUR-FM/Boston, airs on NPR nationwide. (OPB Radio Network will carry the series Wednesdays during The Noon Report beginning March 20th.)

Jennings's introductions to each piece address recent developments in the Islamic world. Beginning with the teachings of Islam and what it means to be a Muslim in modern society, the series examines the huge influx of Muslim immigrants to the United States, the status and role of women in Muslim societies, and the current resurgence of Islam throughout the world.

In the weeks to come here are a few of the subjects that will be discussed. "Islam in America: The Immigrant Experience" - Muslim immigrants to the United States discuss the problems and the advantages of starting new lives in

this country. "Black Islam" - This exploration of the growth in Islam among African-Americans features Black Muslims discussing divisions within the movement between two rivals groups - the Nation of Islam and the American Muslim Mission.

"Women and Family in Muslim Societies" - Muslim women and men talk about the teaching of Islam as it relates to women, their rights, and the influence of traditional patriarchal values on their lives.

"Whither Islam: The Future of Islam" - Interviews with Muslims of several nationalities reveal the strength of Islamic values and institutions in their countries and their relevance to the 21st century.

Stations of the OPB Radio Network are: Portland 91.5 FM. Pendleton 90.9 FM, Bend 91.3 FM, and Corvallis 550 AM, with translators serving twelve other areas of Oregon.

Oregon's Ground War

As Oregon tries to cope with population growth, pressure is building to develop unused land. But private landowners are being thwarted by state land use and planning laws. Environmentalists applaud Oregon's conservative approach to land management. After all, they argue, it's impossible to reclaim land once it's been developed. But frustrated landowners believe they should have more options, and more control, over their property. The battle lines are drawn over how to use Oregon's land, and who should decide.

The idea behind existing land use guidelines is to prevent productive farm and forest land from being eliminated. But some "secondary" lands zoned for farming are less suitable for that use, and their owners want the freedom to use the land for other purposes. They say government regulations, by limiting their choice, have robbed them of true "ownership" of their land. Meanwhile, environmentalists and land use planners fear unrestricted development could forever eliminate scarce and valuable farm and forests lands. Striking a balance between development and preservation has not been easy. Almost everyone agrees Oregon's land use planning system could be improved. But does the system need a major overhaul or merely fine-tuning? That question is now before the legislature, and the future of Oregon's landscape depends on decisions they'll make. Which should receive higher priority: developing land to meet growth, or preserving land to retain quality of life? Should land use and planning decisions be under state or local control? Do private citizens have the right to use their land as they choose? Or is there an overriding public interest that justifies government-imposed limits? What do YOU think? On Thursday, February 7, 1991, at 216 North Vancouver Avenue-Sumner Court, the Fluer de Lis Club, a branch of the Oregon Colored Women's Clubs of America, held it's annual "Black History Week Observance".

The program was very informative and very spiritual. The quest speaker was Mr. James C. Mason, Adult Parole Probation Officer with the State of Oregon Department of Corrections. he choose to speak on the byocott of of the Black United Front. He stated that we, as adults, need to become educated. And - the youth, of Portland, need to stay in school and receive their high school diplomas. He, also, stated that the blacks, of Oreogn will all be af-

fected by the passing of Measure 5. The young people who were born in Portland and went to school here did not receive the rich experience of the Black Culture like those who came here in the early forties and late thirties.

Several well-known personalities received recognition, such as: Mary McLeod Bethune, Malcom X, Maggie L. Walker, and others. Mr. Ford and Mrs. Stone were recongnized as being the first Black Teachers in the city of Portland, Oregon. All of these persons helped to pave the way for future generations.

The program was riddled with the singing of old Negro Spirituals which served as a firm anchoring.




