

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#### **Alvin Singleton** the Composer

Sinfonia Diaspora is Alvin Singleton's most recent composition among a body of orchestral essays which include Shadows, A Yellow Rose Petal, and After Fallen Crumbs.

As in his other works, Singleton is less concerned with melody, per se, than he is with color and texture. The long interweaving, overlapping lines which form the deliberately dramatic shapes of his orchestral works evolve from motives which grow, interplay, and mirror each other as they change, resulting in a structural development that is best described as "organic" in

"Titles, according to the composer, "are merely sources of identification like names of people. Only through getting to know a person is one able to give that name meaning." A title is also a springboard for creativity. "The choice of a title is something that creates an image unto itself," he continues. "My titles are often chosen long before any of the music is written, and so are related by association." In the case of Sinfonia Diaspera, the metaphors which the title generates are appropriate to the music. Sinfonia, in its tractional usage, implies a sense of completeness, wholeness and unified structure. Diaspora, on the other hand, implies diversity, dispersal and a "journey" of sorts - in the same manner as when a people and its culture, spread far beyond its place of origin, changes and develops without losing a sense of "where it has been."

**Oregon Dance** Consort: Subsidy **Program** 



Oregon Dance Consort's resident choreographers, Ray Terrill and Judith Catterall, in 1988, began mounting their twice-yearly concerts at the Portland Center for the Performing Arts, they also launched their Ticket Subsidy Program for Forgotten Audiences.

Catterall says the idea began to percolate in 1987 after she attended a meeting in which art marketing leaders discussed audience demographics and development. She was appalled at the casual way in which whole segments of our society were treated as non-entities because it was unlikely that they could ever afford to become paying customers at arts events.

Making use initially of a grant from US West's matching Gift Program, ODC sought to build a cooperative spirit into the foundation s of the program. Tickets and educational materials are placed in the hands of organizations with direct links to the targeted audiences, insuring that they are distributed for maximum impact. Since 1988, over 600 disadvantaged and minority citizens have attended ODC events courtesy of their Ticket Subsidy Program, and nine different organizations have been involved-ranging from The Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center to the NE YWCA and the African American Journal to the Northwest Pilot Project, which serves senior citizens of limited resources.

ODC's next event is a concert of two new multi-cultural works at the Intermediate Theatre of the PCPA on May 10 and 11. If your organization would like to participate in the ticket Subsidy Program as a recipient, or if you would like to sponsor tickets to one of the shows, call Judith at 286-6472.

#### Portland Arts & **Lectures Presents** Writer Jane Smiley

Novelist and short-story writer Jane Smiley concludes the 1990/91 Portland Arts & lectures series, Thursday, May 9. Underwritten by Nordstrom, the evening with Ms. Smiley takes place in the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall at

In her two most popular works, The Age of Grief (1987), and the combined novellas Ordinary Love & Good Will (1989), Jane Smiley skillfully extracts aspects of family life that exist under the surface of everyday living; fleeting observations take on foreboding implications. Furthermore, in an age increasingly obsessed with family issues, Smiley's stories provide an intriguing and unconventional wisdom.

Smiley also wrote The Greenlanders (1988), "each long chapter...has its expansive theme, just as the theme of the Great Extinction runs through the entire novel. But the cadences of day-to-day village life, the larger social dynamics as well as the domestic particulars, comprise the true riches of The Greenlanders" (Howard Norman, The New York Times Book Review).

Smiley received her B.A. in English from Vasser in 1971, and her doctorate from the University of Iowa. Currently a teacher of creative writing and literature at Iowa State University. Smiley lives with her husband and two daughters in Ames, Iowa and Lac du Flambeau, Wisconsin.

## "KMHD (FM89.1) 1991 Radiothon"

The annual on-air fundraiser for public radio KMHD will be held May 3rd through to the 12th, KMHD station manager Tom Costello announced.

KMHD's general manager, John Rice agreed with his station manager. "We are, after all, a public radio station. The majority of our funding comes from our listeners. Our license-holder, Mt. Hood Community College, provides about 43%, local businesses contribute approximately 8%, and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting provides nearly 13%. If it weren't for our contributing listeners we couldn't operate at anywhere near the level we
