Portland artist Isaka Shamsud-Din

Portland artist Isaka Shamsud-Din has been commissioned by the Artquake board of directors to paint an original work for use as the festival's 1991 graphic image. Shamsud-Din's creation will be featured on the event's poster and program and as wearable art on a T-shirt for Portland's 15th annual celebration of the arts.

While he draws on numerous media, subjects and presentations for his work, Shamsud-Din is best known for his giant, colorful murals. His murals currently hang at the Multnomah County Justice Center, the Portland Art Museum, Portland State University and the Cleve Allen Dental Clinic, among others. He created the murals on both sides of the Northeast Business Center on Martin Luther King Boulevard in Northeast Portland, and, as an interactive dimension of his Zulu village mural now on display at the Children's Museum, he built in half of a domed Zulu house

Shamsud-Din has lived in Portland most of his 50 years. He has taught art classes at Pacific Northwest College of Art, Portland State University and Reed College, as well as privately.

His commissioned Artquake work will be unveiled at a public reception in early June and will be on display during the festival at the Visual Arts Gallery on the fourth
