Literary artists from throughout the Northwest will have an opportunity to read from their works at Artquake 91 through a series of new competitions this summer.

Artquake's Literary Arts Committee will host a series of three literary arts performance competitions in June. Twelve audience-selected winners, four from each contest, then will move to a final "read-off" in July. The six winners of the final round will be offered an Artquake reader's contract and honorarium to perform at the Labor Day weekend festival.

The competition has been designed to create an opportunity for new and little-known writers, as well as published literary artists, to publicly perform and to find a larger audience for their works.

Doug Marx will serve as master of ceremonies for the contests and will make the final evaluation of audience response. A \$2 fee will admit performers and un public.


