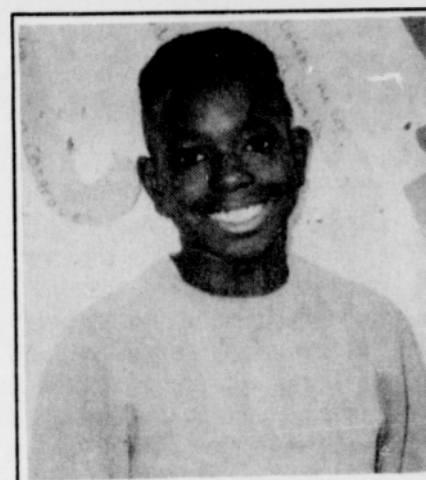
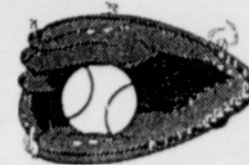
When I grow older I want to be a baby doctor and a dance teacher. When I am in high school I want to be on the cheerleading team. Most of all I want to have an educational life.

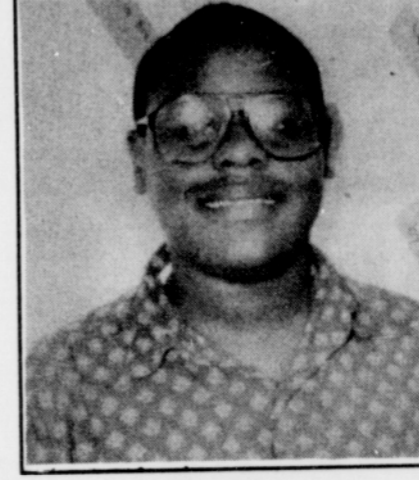

One Church, One Child Acclaimed Artwork Highlights Annual 'For The Children Who Wait' Banquet



"The Flaminio" cartoon classic will have a new home on the CBS network.

A specially-commissioned painting by the Northwest Acclaimed artist, Ishaq SchamsudDin will be unveiled at the One Church, One Child third annual banquet November 9, 1991. Mr. Shamsud-Din is presenting this work of art to One Church, One Child as a commemorative to the organization's goal of preserving the African American family through adoption. Each year a community service award is given to an individual who has demonstrated

outstanding efforts in support of adoption placements of African American homes. This year their name will be placed under the painting at the One Church, One Child office. The recipient will also receive a commemorative award.

"It is fitting that we selected a local artist to create a tribute to our honoree," said Dr. Virginia Phillips, executive director of the organization's adoptive recruitment program. "We are privileged that Ishaq Shamsud-Din generously agreed to donate one of his award-winning paintings for our awards banquet."

"I strongly support the placement

of Black children in Black homes where they can be given the nurturing and support needed to survive in a racist society. Children must always be reminded of the struggle of our ancestors so that they can draw from the strengths they (our ancestors) displayed in the building of this country," says Mr. Shamsud-Din. "This can only be completely accomplished when the child grows up in his/her own culture."

The banquet, known as "For The Children Who Wait" Banquet, will be held at the Red Lion Lloyd Center with a reception at 6 pm and dinner begin-

ning at 7 pm. The keynote speaker will be Zena Oglesby, executive director of the Institute for Black Parenting. A published author and certified social worker with a background in adoptions, child protective services and community mental health, Oglesby is considered an expert in minority adoptions. In 1988 he designed and implemented the first fully licensed Back adoption and foster family agency in Southern California.

The Honorary chairpersons of this year's event are Senator Bill McCoy and Representative Margaret Carter, both strong supporters of the mission of One Church, One Child.

Tickets for the banquet are \$30 each. For reservation information, contact the One Church, One Child office at 285-7634.

One Church, One Child of Oregon was established in 1988 with the mission of seeking African American families to adopt African American children. Since that time, the agency has achieved 64 successful placements of African American children.
