Ms. Kimberly Bridwell, 24, who works for the Bureau of Labor and Industries Job Corps unit at the new State Office Building, Lloyd Center location, was honored March 10 in Washington, D.C., by Joint Action in Community Service, Inc. The Joint Action Service organization, part of the U.S. Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration, is dedicated to helping disadvantaged youth enter mainstream society.

Ms. Bridwell is a Job Corps graduate from Tongue Point Job Corps Center in Astoria. For the past six years she has worked as a Job Corps screening specialist for the Bureau of Labor & Industries, helping other young people

find the path to success. In her off-working time, she has volunteered to help over 600 students leaving Job Corps centers to get connected with housing information, medical services and job opportunities.

Ms. Bridwell specializes in working with "high-risk" youth involved in the Juvenile Justice System and works closely with Juvenile Corrections Personnel such as Lonnie Nettles at Martin Luther King Center, as well as the Donald E. Long Juvenile Home in Northeast Portland.

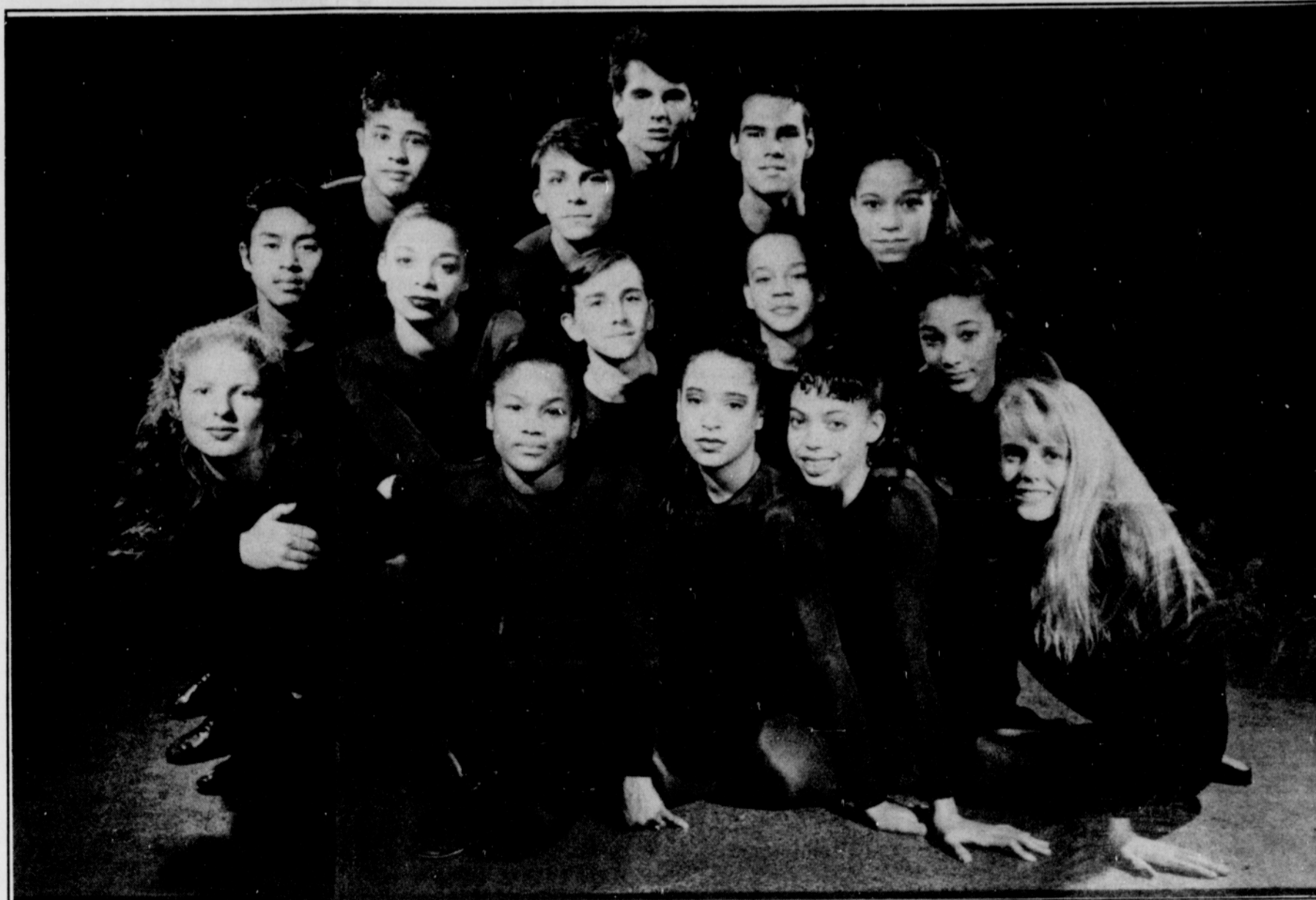

The Jefferson Dancers



The Jefferson Dancers, created in 1976 and directed this year by Julane Stites, is the performing arm of the nationally known Dance Department at Jefferson High School in Portland. The ensemble is composed of the school's most advanced dance students who have come to the Performing Arts Center at Jefferson for dance training, either through the Portland Public Schools or through the school's affiliation with Portland Community College.

The Jefferson Dancers repertoire includes over 70 works of tap, ballet,

jazz, modern, ethnic and musical theatre dance pieces. Ten to twenty works are active for any season, including internationally renowned and award-winning works. Choreographers who have worked with the company in the past include Donald McKayle, Lynn Dally, Honi Coles, Alwin Nikolais, Paul Russell, Brenda Bufalino, Lowell Smith, Royston Maldoom, and Raymond Sawyer, to name a few. Alumni of the Jefferson Dancers who have been fortunate to study under such masters are currently performing pro-

fessionally in many U. S. and foreign cities, including New York, Los Angeles, Montreal, Denver, Kyoto, and Milan.

Dancers audition for the company each spring and those selected make a commitment to perform with the group for one year. They study under a rigorous schedule of dance technique classes, a two-hour daily rehearsal, and a full load of academic classes in which intended to be broad as well as deep and, unlike most professional dance companies, the Jefferson Dancers study and

execute works in all dance styles.

The company performs extensively throughout the Northwest, and western Canada for community concerts and school assemblies, culminating each spring in the two completely different programs at the Hult Center in Eugene and their popular home-season concerts at Portland's Intermediate Theatre in the Portland Center for the Performing Arts.

The New Look In Health Care

What frenzied space is it that for eight hours a day, five days a week resembles nothing so much as the hyperactive area in front of a Broadway theatre on opening night? The hoopla of searchlights and the flashing bulbs of photographers is missing, but the energy, diligence [and service] is there, all carefully organized.

We're describing a very special patient and visitor support service provided by the sophisticated but caring Providence Medical Center at the 49th Street entrance--and across the street at the Providence Plaza Professional Building and adjoining parking structure. It is difficult to convey a sense of the chaos that would result if there were not such a system in place to handle the complex interaction of patients, visitors, professionals, vendors and sup-

port organizations.

A modern hospital complex requires an external traffic control just as sophisticated in its implementation as such internal systems as the delivery of medical care or the operation of complex building services from heating to air conditioning. In the particular case, this writer, a former volunteer and patient at the center, can speak directly to this point. The Valet Parking Service was implemented about three years ago and is one of a number of important support services added in parallel to a constantly expanding, health care delivery system for our community.

Interestingly, Providence Medical Center was the pioneer in the region for this particular amenity and the other hospital providing this service in the Portland area consulted Providence before setting up its own program. Valet Parking is a division of the hospital's Department of Security, Safety & Trans-

portation. The director is Mr. Harry Daniels, Jr., the son of our community's late Bishop Harry B. Daniels, Sr. (Greater Mt. Calvary Church Of God And Christ). The Parking coordinator is Ms. Debby Washington.

The young women parking attendants in the photo are two of the seven dedicated employees of the valet service. Liz Bowden played basketball at Grant High School and is interested in pursuing Computer Science. She has two children, Kevonna, 3, and Kevin Jr., age 1. Her mother Gloria Bowden, is a staff phlebotomist at Providence. Holly J. Campynol attended Oregon City High School and plans a degree in art.
