Throughout its history, the Association has maintained a strong commitment to help young persons achieve higher education and financial assistance, through minimal was given annually from 1917-1954. The Katherine Gray Memorial Scholarship, honoring the OACWC's first President, was established in 1954 and mandated that a minimum of \$200 a year be given in scholarships. The mandate today establishes a minimum scholarship of \$500 annually; the tea's success determining the number of scholarships awarded and educational support given.

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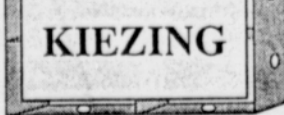
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"10th Anniversary Celebration Of The black Women's Gathering"
