Thursday, July 23, Beatrice Oshika, PSU linguistics professor, discusses "Natural and Artificial Intelligence," exploring the difference between intelligence and its natural and artificial forms.

A symposium on Reforming Socialist Economies takes place Thursday, July 17, from 8 to 10 a.m. at the World Trade Center's International Conference Center on the mezzanine level at 25 S.W. Salmon. John All, PSU

professor of economics, moderates a panel of resident PSU faculty and visiting professors. Ingo Klein from the Bruno-Leuschner College of Economics in Berlin, East Germany, discusses "The Rough Road to German Reunification;" Mao Zihui, professor and dean of the school of management at Southwest Jiaotong University in China, explores "China's Ongoing Reform Process;" and Frank Munk, PSU professor emeritus of political science, discusses "Yeltsin's Economic Reforms in the Former Soviet Union."
