DR. GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER

Scientist

George Washington Carver started his life as a sickly, orphaned Negro slave baby, but his thirst for knowledge and his determination to become a scientist made him one of the most honored men of his time. He experimented with peanuts and sweet potatoes, getting hundreds of new products from both. He utilized waste materials and made roads out of cotton, insulating boards out of corn stalks, paper from wisteria, pottery out of red clay. He refused staggering salaries to work elsewhere, and remained at his small laboratory at Tuskegee College until his death.
