New In-State Dialing Plan Begins

Effective Sunday, Oregon phone users can now dial "1" plus "503" and the seven-digit telephone number on in-state long distance calls. It's the first step to making more telephone prefixes available to meet future telecommunications growth in the state.

The new dialing plan, approved last year by the Oregon Public Utility Commission, applies to all long distance calls within the "503" area code. Currently, customers dial "1" plus the seven-digit number on in-state long distance calls. On July 11 long distance calls within the state will recode to be completed by telephone the insurance needs of area company switching computers.
