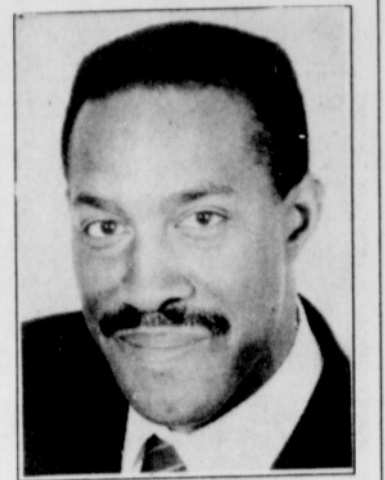

### Clergies Sponsor Summer Youth Program

In the summer of 1985, a group of North Portland pastors and community leaders met with former mayor Bud Clark to express concern over the increasing gang presence in our neighborhood. His response was: "Wait 'til the rains come. They'll move back to L.A."

Well, the rains have come and gone many times. And now, eight years later, there are at least 1,800 known gang members in our city, not counting the wanna-bes. We have a serious problem, and it's time to do something about it. Together.

From the Inside Out is sponsored by African-American Clergies, a group of local ministers reaching out to inner city youth (ages 6-19), gang members and families.

The local churches are putting together a summer program to serve breakfast and lunch for 200-400 kids

a day Monday-Friday at St. Mark Baptist Church at 103 NE Morris St. (one block east of the NIKE outlet store on MLK Blvd). We plan to provide clothing for kids in crisis along with job placement assistance and counseling for teenagers ages 14-19. There will be a 24-hour hotline for emergency assistance and crisis intervention. And every Saturday throughout the summer, we will host an outreach program in one of the neighborhood parks (from 12:00 noon to 5:00pm) providing recreation, gospel music and refreshments for youth. This is real help--From the Inside Out.

## New Micro Loan Program To Benefit Small Business

Cascades West Financial Services of Corvallis, a community-based, non-profit lender, has been designated as the first Microloan Lender in Oregon by the U.S. Small Business Administration under a new federal program for innovative business lending, announced John Gilman, director of the Portland District SBA Office.

"Small business is the backbone of Oregon's economy," said Governor Barbara Roberts, who welcomed the pilot as a first step toward a state-wide program. "The Microloan program will help create new jobs and give Oregonians, particularly women, minorities and those in timber dependent communities, the chance to succeed in their own businesses."

The program provides for small scale, short term, fixed interest lending combined with technical assistance to budding entrepreneurs. The loan fund can be used to make very small loans up to \$25,000. Cascades West is making for an average loan size of \$7,500 during the first year in order to qualify for a lower interest rate, according to Debbie Wright who developed the Oregon proposal for

Cascades West. Cascades West Financial Services will receive \$340,000 in loans from SBA for establishing a revolving loan fund for community-based lending to start-up or to support existing businesses. The local matching funds which are required to be non-federal dollars have been pledged by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and Grand Ronde, and by First Interstate Bank of Oregon and Siuslaw Valley Bank.

The law which created this federal program targets "women, low-income and minority entrepreneurs, business owners and other individuals possessing the capability to operate successful business concerns." Cascades West will also emphasize lending to rural businesses, said Wright. The selection of Cascades West came after two years of preparation, said Inge McNeese who headed a taskforce which worked with Cascades West on drafting the application.

Under their Microloan program, SBA solicits applications from community-based nonprofit organizations

with lending experience. The selected organizations can receive up to \$750,000 in ten-year loans from SBA but must raise local funds to qualify. The microlenders must also offer free business management assistance to their borrowers.

A total of 96 Microlenders have been selected by SBA in the first two years of a five year program authorized by Congress in 1991. In the first two years the program has been extended to 44 states, said Erskins Bowles, SBA Administrator. Since June 1992 the program has made 330 loans worth \$3.3 million nationally. More than 37% have gone to members of minority groups and nearly 45% have gone to businesses owned by women. The average loans size nationally is \$9,966.

Residents in these 14 mid-Valley and Northwest Oregon counties will be eligible to apply when the program becomes operational this fall: Benton, Clackamas, Hood River, Jefferson, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Wasco, Washington, and Yamhill.

Multnomah County has approximately 25,000 outstanding arrest warrants: warrants issued as recently as ten days ago or as long as ten years ago. In an effort to reduce this backlog of outstanding arrest warrants, Multnomah County will hold Settlement Day on Friday, July 9 and Saturday, July 10, 1993.

Individuals who want to check in, discuss or clear up their outstanding warrants can do so on Settlement Day with out fear of being arrested. They can come to the second floor of the Justice Center, 1120 SW Third Avenue, between 9am and 5pm on Friday and between 9am and 12 noon on Saturday. There they will meet with representatives from the Multnomah County District Attorney's office and the Metropolitan Public Defender's office to discuss their problem and possible solutions. There will be no cost to the person for these legal

services. If an agreement can be made with the District Attorney's office the matter will be disposed of that day.

The only matters that can be processed on Settlement Day are Multnomah County warrants for misdemeanors, warrants for traffic crimes, possession of lesser amounts of controlled substances, felony property crimes, failure to complete a DUI Diversion Program and failure to make child support. It will not be possible to process warrants from countries other than Multnomah County or warrants from Gresham or Troutdale Municipal Courts. Other matters that cannot be handled on Settlement Day are probation violations, traffic infractions (ie: running a red light), parking tickets, class A or B felonies, or felonies involving assaultive behavior. Settlement Day was held twice in 1992 and each time hundreds of warrants were
