Packwood On North American Free Trade Agreement

Mexico is one of the United States fastest growing export markets. Between 1986 and 1992, U.S. exports to Mexico increased from \$12.4 billion to an estimated \$44 billion, which is twice as fast as U.S. exports to the rest of the world. Oregon exports to Mexico rose 190 percent from \$19 million to \$55 million.

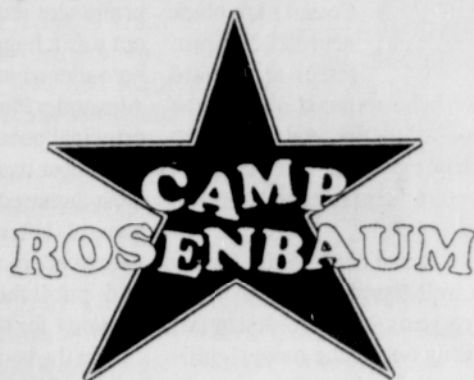

On Wednesday, June 30, 1993 Camp Rosenbaum hosted its 23rd annual Visitors Day in Warrenton, Oregon. June 30 was marked for a special presentation in honor of camp founder, Fred Rosenbaum, Oregon Air

National Guard Brigadier General (retired) and Housing Authority Portland (HAP) board chairman. The event featured dignitaries and special guests throughout the state of Oregon to include Governor Barbara Roberts, HAP



executive director Denny West and Brigadier General Gene Kate, Oregon Adjutant General, and a host of other guests from around the state.

The program was founded 23 years ago by Fred Rosenbaum who at the time was chairman of Oregon Housing Authority, and Brigadier General of Oregon Air Guard. He visited the camp grounds with his wife and family at that time there was hardly any activities on the camp grounds and by it being right on the coast, Mr. Rosenbaum thought it would be a good idea to start a childrens camp there. So Mr. Rosenbaum took the idea up with Governor McCall. So the Military Department through the Oregon National Guard and The Housing Authority of Portland formed a partnership and started the camp. Mr. Rosenbaum said the first three years of trying to start the camp was filled with trial and error. But, Mr. Rosenbaum didn't give up. Engulfed with organizational staffing and financial problems he hung in there, made the right contacts to get the camp on the right track, and has been a successful program every since.

The program is a joint venture between The Housing Authority of Portland and the Oregon National Guard to send low income public housing children to a week long citizenship camp on the coast of Oregon. This unique partnership enables over 145 young campers to enjoy a view of the ocean, campfire at night and loving care and guidance from the volunteer Housing Authority and National Guard staff.

Fish Emergency Service Volunteers Become Marshals

Staff and volunteers of FISH Emergency Services, an emergency food and clothing provider, raised their right hands and promised to uphold seven different points of the Drug-Free Marshal pledge as they were sworn in and deputized as Drug Free Marshals.

The Drug-Free Marshals campaign was originally launched in Los Angeles in April where more than 500 attendees watched as the FBI "swore in" over 200 kids as Drug-Free Marshals. The campaign, which is being coordinated by the Church of Scientology, was brought to Portland with a similar kick-off event in June where 32 kids were sworn in as Marshals by Multnomah County Sheriff Deputy and D.A.R.E. officer, Wayne McDonnell. Several Portland churches, schools and businesses have contributed to and helped promote the campaign.

The Drug-Free Marshal pledge has kids promise to live a drug-free life, show their friends that a drug-free life is more fun, help their fellow Drug Free Marshals, learn more about how drugs really harm people, tell people the truth about the harmful effects of drugs, help their family and



friends be drug-free and set a good example to all children by leading the way to a drug free USA. As part of upholding this pledge, the new Marshals are touring Portland in "posses", deputizing community leaders and VIPs.

Angie Mann, spokesperson for the Church of Scientology's Lead the Way to a Drug Free USA program, commented, "Several groups of kids have chosen community leaders to visit and deputize as Marshals. They are quite serious about their new 'jobs' and want to eventually make every community leader a Marshal, including the Governor."

Gloria Colvin, Executive Director of FISH Emergency Services and Portland's newest Marshal, told the kids, "What you're doing is very important. It keeps people reminded about helping others stay away from drugs and keep them thinking with being drug free, we really appreciate what you're doing."
