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Sports Volunteers Needed

The National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) kicked into full gear last week at Portland State University, Benson High School and St. Mary's Academy with the assistance of the Police Activities League (PAL) and the Oregon National Guard.

PSU was awarded \$40,000 grant from the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Department of Health and Human Services to conduct the NYSP which emphasizes sports instruction, life-long skills and substance abuse prevention for 250 youth, ages 10-16, that reside with low-income families. The camp runs from July 12-August 13, 1993 and there are still spaces available.

A medical exam is required before entry into the camp, but enrollment applications are available from PAL, 248-5011.

Volunteers over the age of 17 are needed to work during program hours. Volunteers can participate for one day to support peer counselors, one sport to support a coach, all week... the possibilities are endless.

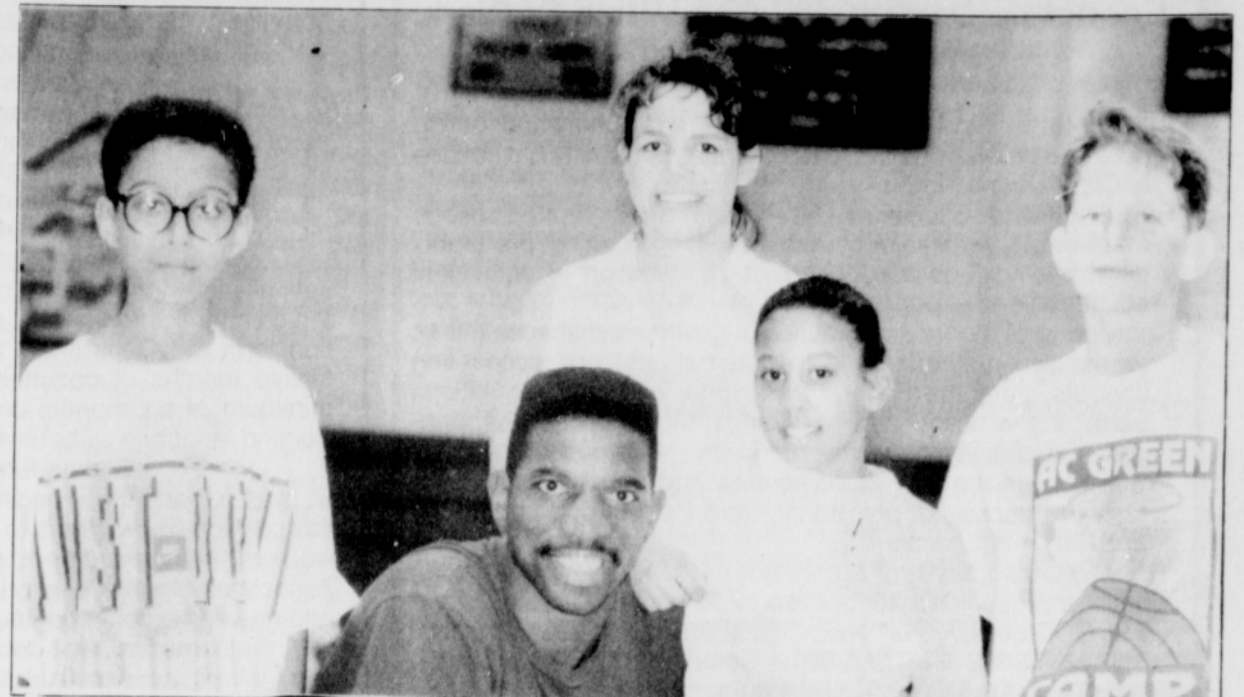

A.C. Green More Than A Basketball Player

 A.C. Green, was born in Portland in 1963, played on the State Championship Basketball Team at Benson High School in 1981. At Oregon State University he was All-Pac-10 for three years and the leagues top player as a senior. A.C. was then the number one pick of the Los Angeles Lakers of the National Basketball Association.

But, A.C. Green is a lot more than a basketball player. The 29 year old Green, just finished the eighth annual A.C. Green Basketball Day Camp at Concordia College in northeast Portland. First you might ask why is the camp in northeast Portland, when it could be three times its size at Oregon State. The main reason is A.C. grew up just blocks away from Concordia College. He really wanted to keep it in the "Hood". But as A.C. is different than most Pro Basketball players, his Basketball Camp is also very different than more camps today.

The main goals of the A.C. Green's Camp are to: 1.) Share the joys and opportunities of living for Jesus Christ. 2.) Teach Basketball all skills and strategies. 3.) Create a fun and exciting environment for participants to grow socially. In order to accomplish the above goals it is essential that they keep the instructor to participant ratio under one to ten. This will allow time for individual attention and analysis of the camper's strengths and weaknesses. This quality time for interaction can also facilitate positive role modeling and establishment of meaning relationships.

The commitment to the above goals and concerns for the individual have been a major reason for the camp; being so successful.

In 1986 there were 45 participants at A.C.'s camp. This year over 350 campers participated in two weeks and four half day sessions.

Each day of the camp, campers learned something new. Here are just a few drills taught at A.C. Green's basketball camp. From shooting, baseline shots, lay-up, right and left,

bank shots, drop step power move, hesitation dribble, cone weave dribble, spee dribble, cross-over dribble, fake shot and dribble, give and go lay ups, 3 man weave, four corner passing, rebounding closeout and the Montana cross over move. But the most important time of the day was devotions. Each day after break, A.C., along with camp director Joel Schuldheisz there would be a 15 minute devotion for all campers to hear.

"For physical training is of some value, but Godliness has value for all things." 1st Timothy 4:8.

This was just one of many passages that the campers heard each day.

On the last day of camp there contest of cone dribbling, hot shot shooting and bump out. And the team M.V.P. but this M.V.P. stands for most valuable person.

I hope I have given you an understanding of what a very good camp this can be for your child. So remember next summer when its time to think about a camp for your child, A.C. Green Basketball Day Camp should be on the top of the list.

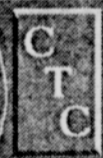

Invitation To Bids

The Vancouver Housing Authority will receive bids for the project to Provide Vinyl Siding & Soffit Materials for 64 Apartments until 2:00 p.m. Pacific Standard Time on the 3rd day of August, 1993, at Vancouver Housing Authority, 500 Omaha Way, Vancouver, Washington 98661 at which time and place all bids will be publicly opened and read aloud.

Proposed forms of contract documents, including plans and specifications, are on file at the office of Vancouver Housing Authority at 500 Omaha Way, Vancouver Washington 98661 and at the office of Construction Data-Eastside, Portland; Construction Data-Westside, Portland; Daily Journal of Commerce, Portland; S.W. Washington Contractors Association, Vancouver; and Dodge/Scan, Seattle.

Copies of the documents may be obtained by depositing No dollars (\$0) with the Vancouver Housing Authority for each set of documents so obtained. Such deposit will be refunded to each person who returns the plans, specifications and other documents in good condition within 10 days after bid opening.

A certified check or bank draft, payable to Vancouver Housing Authority, U.S. Government bonds, or a satisfactory bid bond executed by the bidder and acceptable sureties in an amount equal to five percent of the bid shall be submitted with each bid, or separate performance and payment bonds, each for 50 percent or more of the contract price, or a 20 percent cash escrow, or a 25 percent irrevocable letter of credit.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish and pay for satisfactory performance and payment bond or bonds.

As permitted by state law and required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development:

- a. Retainage is 10 percent not 5 percent,
- b. Interest will not accrue on retainage, and
- c. Bonds or securities may not be substituted as an alternate form of retainage.

The Vancouver Housing Authority reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any informalities in the bidding.

No bid shall be withdrawn for a period of 60 days subsequent to the opening of bids without the consent of the Vancouver Housing Authority.
