## PAYOUT TO MIGRANT WORKERS

Bureau of Labor and Industries' officials are supervising a payout of over \$19,000 in back wages to at least 28 illegal aliens who were working in the Bend area. The workers, who were apprehended by federal Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) earlier this week, have been given 10 days to return voluntarily to Mexico. After the INS raid at their job site in the Deschutes National Forest, state labor officials moved in quickly to ensure that all the workers received paychecks before they left the country.

"We want to make sure the workers have been paid fairly," said Labor Commissioner Mary Wendy Roberts. "By supervising the payout, we can ensure that even if the workers don't receive their pay-

checks during the next 10 days, their money will be forwarded to them."

The laborers were employed by two local forest labor contractors, Vaughn Wommack of Umqua Valley Forestry, Inc. and Tim Justice of Agony Gulch, Inc. Each owed their workers more than 10 days wages at an average hourly rate of \$11.40 per hour. So far, 19 checks totalling \$12,220 have been issued to employees of Umqua Valley forestry.

Approximately 11 employees of Agony Gulch anticipate receiving their checks on August 12, 1993.

In addition to supervising the payout of wages, the bureau is also investigating both Wommack and Justice for possible forest labor contracting violations.

### At Risk Teenage Girls Need "Big Sisters"

Women who would like to make a difference for young girls in crisis can provide friendship support and caring through Volunteers of America's Big Sister Program. Volunteers spend about 10 hours per month participating in activities with the at-risk youth.

## FAIR EMPLOYMENT

## Marylhurst College Held Open House

### In Celebration Model Head Start Program

Marylhurst College is invited media representatives, corporate sponsors and government officials to attend an August 3 open house showcasing Marylhurst's first-of-its-kind Head Start science training program.

Guests had the opportunity to see Marylhurst's unique Summer Science Institute in action. The model program, held in cooperation with Portland's Albina Head Start Program, is designed to encourage low income and disadvantaged children to develop a love for science at an early age.

Twenty Albina Head Start teachers were selected to participate in the program and receive four weeks of intensive science training that included classroom instruction, hands-on experimentation and field trips.

Beginning this September, the teachers will apply what they learn in the classroom, passing on their own curiosity about science to three-four- and five-year-old Head Start students.

"The program demystifies science," said Ron Herndon, director of the Albina Head Start Program. "The teachers have an opportunity to develop specific lesson plans that they can put to work in their classrooms. It gives them confidence that they never would have had."

The program, in its second summer at Marylhurst, is being funded by grants from 41 corporations, foundations and individual donors. Among the donations are a grant from the Oregon Community Foundation Summerville Fund and a grant from the Bay Foundation. Hewlett-Packard

Company and the Challenge Foundation both donated to the program.

Each of the participating 20 teachers received a stipend, five units of science credit and a certificate of completion at the end of the program. A graduation ceremony took place.

The program was first proposed by Nancy Wilgenbusch, Marylhurst President and Barbara Brunkow, Vice President for College Relations in the hopes that it will serve as a model for other Head Start programs throughout the country, most of which do not have a strong science component.

"Children have a natural curiosity about the world around them," Wilgenbusch said. "They need to have that curiosity nurtured and transformed into learning about science at an early age."

## College Information Night At PSU

Project P.L.U.S. (Preparing and Learning for University Studies) is a federally funded program which encourages low-income students in middle and high schools to stay in school, graduate, and eventually enroll in a community college, college, or university. At no cost, the project provides services that include assistance with college admission and financial aid applications; career awareness workshops; campus and business visitations; counseling in motivation, self-understanding, decision making and study skills; and referrals to other community service agencies.

Project P.L.U.S./Educational Talent Search, Portland State University, will host a Student/Parent College Information Night on Thursday, Aug. 26, from 6 to 7:45 p.m. at the Campus Ministry at PSU (633 SW Montgomery). Information and assistance will be provided with college admissions, financial aid and scholarship applications.

"We hope, in particular, to attract Portland and Hillsboro high school students and their parents, although any interested person under age 27 will find this helpful," says Peggy Adams, interim director of Project P.L.U.S. For information call: 725-4458.

## Assistance For Army Nurses

The Army has disclosed four financial educational programs available to nurses who are members of the Army Reserve. These programs include: Tuition Assistance, Health Professional Loan Payment, Reserve G.I. Bills, and New Specialized Training Assistance Program.

Army Reserve Nurse Corps Officers have the opportunity to perfect nursing, teaching, supervisory, and administrative skills, and learn new methods in military nursing.

Army Reserve nurses earn additional pay to supplement their monthly income. Army Reserve nurses earn a day's pay for each four hour period of unit training, and two weeks of full pay and allowances during annual training.
