

Minority Golf Program

The two-year-old Orlando Minority Golf Association (OMGA) will hold its inaugural golf tournament at Walt Disney World's "Magic Linkdom" August 14.

Nearly 30 minority youths aged 8 to 16 are participating in instructional clinics each Saturday at the Disney Inn supervized by Walt Disney World Golf Professional Kevin Weickel. They will compete in tournament play for the first time ever.

The OMGA was established by a concerned Orlando-area dentist, Dr. Thomas Dorsey. During the two-year period Dorsey has worked to establish the OMGA, Weickel has donated golf clubs, balls, hats, gloves, shoes and other necessary equipment. Now he is donating his teaching time, range time and the Oak Trail Golf Course for the Saturday afternoon instruction clinics.

Weickel and three other Disney teaching professionals begin each of the Saturday afternoon sessions with a trick-shot demonstration, concepts of the golf swing, video analysis of each player's swing and talks on how crucial junior golf is to everyone.
