Hospital, Neighbors, Government Plan Future Health Provisions

The "Communications Task Force" representing neighborhood, hospital and government interests, is making significant progress to assure neighborhood and community input in the planning process for Southwest Washington Medical Center (SWMC).

The Task Force is composed of representatives from city and county neighborhood associations, city and county neighborhood staff and the hospital administration. It has been meeting at least monthly since last spring.

The Task Force was the brainchild of the Vancouver Neighborhood Coalition which wanted to have the hospital, neighborhoods, city and county government meet regularly to open up the lines of communication and share information and provide a

method of participation in hospital decisions.

The first mission of the Task Force is to study emergency care in the county with special emphasis on Memorial's Emergency Room. The Task Force has begun to assist the hospital in identifying short-term, long term and emergency care issues.

Jeff Selberg, chief executive officer of the hospital and SWMC's Bruce Hill, director of Emergency Services, have attended recent meetings. A sub-committee is reviewing local public participation models that have worked to develop an effective process for community planning.

City Asks Residents To Use Leaf Disposal Programs

City residents are urged not to pile leaves in the street because they are clogging storm drains.

Although the City does not provide leaf collection/disposal from private property, there are now three programs for citizens to dispose of fall leaf and yard debris. These programs are important when yards are overwhelmed with leaves and burning is no longer an option. Burning has been banned permanently in the Vancouver area.

1. Pilot Yard Debris Program: This year-round program offers curbside pickup of yard debris on an every other week basis. Up to 192 gallons of yard debris (six 32-gallon cans) may be set out for \$4 per month. During December, January and February, the service is once per month. For those who have only an occasional need for yard debris pickup, an on-call service

is available. The cost is \$2 per 32 gallon container with a \$4 minimum. To request either of these programs, customers call 892-2502.

2. Composting: Backyard composting is a great way to turn leaves into garden enhancements for the spring. Master composters are available for more information and to show people how. Their number is 254-8436.

3. Chipper program: The city offers a yard debris chipper to each neighborhood organization once each year. A city crew member operates the chipper for the neighborhood. Chips can be returned to yards as mulch, added to a compost pile, or used for trails or animal bedding. Call Office of Neighborhoods, 696-8222.

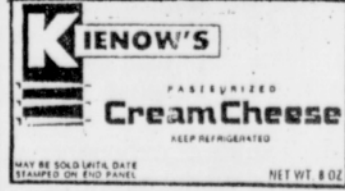
