Regular Tri-Met fares and transfers apply on the 200-Rivergate.


All Rivergate Shuttles are lift-equipped.

"Three Strikes, You're Out" Campaign Launched

State Representative Michael Payne, D-Baker City, announced the formation of a statewide committee to gather signatures for a proposed 'Three Strikes, You're Out" ballot measure. This measure would require life sentence without possibility of parole or early release for persons convicted of three violent crimes. Included are all class A felony crimes against persons such as murder, assault, and rape.

Rep. Payne said, "We will be working with neighborhood watch groups, victims rights organizations,

and concerned citizens to put this measure on the November ballot. Oregonians should no longer fear that violent repeat offenders will pass through a revolving prison-door to victimize society again."

The "Three Strikes, You're Out" committee said that' its initial poll showed 86 percent of likely Oregon voters would support the proposed ballot measure. Washington voters approved a similar measure by a 3 to 1 ratio last year. After public outcry over the murder of 12-year-old Polly Klaas, California petitioners are also


working to pass such legislation.

"If Washington and California both pass this law, Oregon must do at least as much to protect our communities," said Rep Payne. The Oregon proposal would take into account violent felonies committed in other states as well as those offenses committed in this state.

The Secretary of State said that the "Three Strikes, You're Out" committee must gather 66,771 valid signatures by July 8, 1994 to qualify for the general election ballot.
