He raved and roared over the microphone as he spoke about the unfortunate parents, whose kids have gone away from the values and principles that Dr. King preached and lived, using Quran, based oratory and phrases to impress the ecstatic audience.

If adoration and glorifications could raise the dead, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. would have risen from his grave and strolled quietly into the waiting hands of dignitaries who gathered at this occasion. At sixty-five he would have shook hands with Mary


