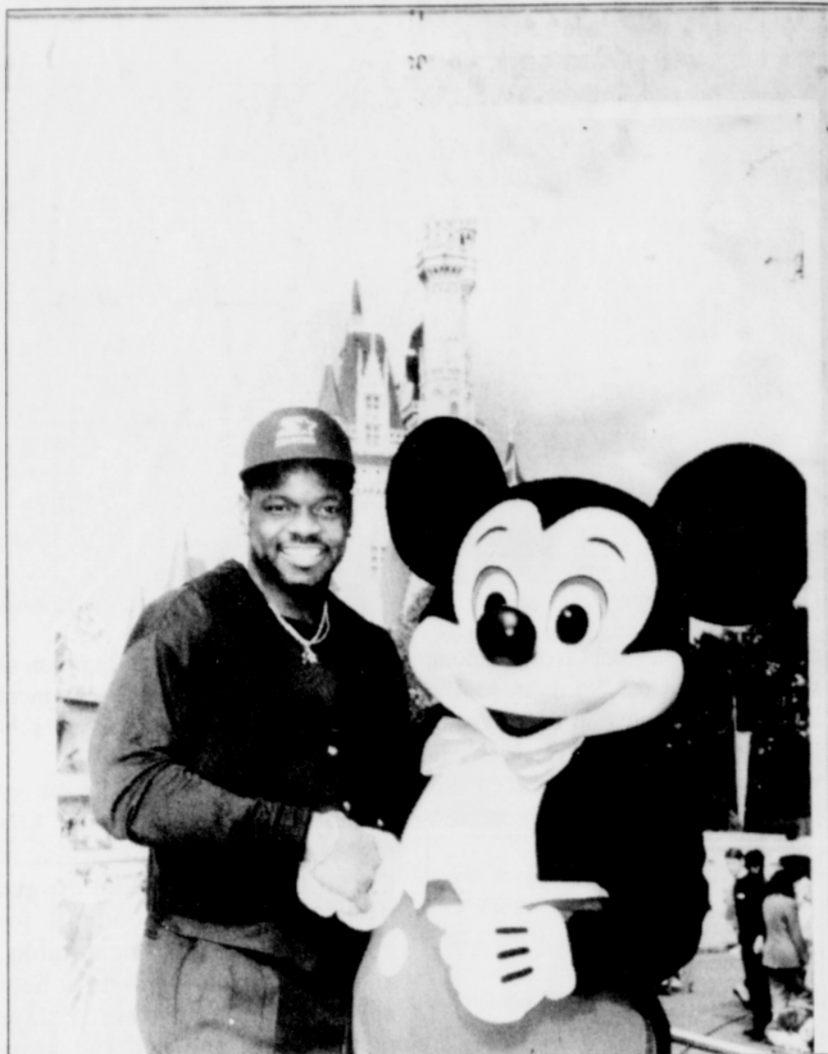

BENSON'S GIRLS WIN P.I.L. AGAIN!

The Benson High School Girls Basketball Team did something that no one thought they would do? That's lose a game in the Portland Interscholastic League. A this loss was not by forfeit, it was by one point to Wilson, 49-48 on Tech's home court last Wednesday night. Keyawna Williams scored on a missed shot with no time on the clock to give Benson. It's first loss on the court this year. Williams led the Trojans in scoring with 15 points, as Mfon Udoka's 13 points paced Benson.

Tech came back strong on Friday with a easy 68-32 win over Roosevelt. Udoka was back to her old self with 25 big points and almost as many rebounds. Kim Green, who had only five points in the loss to Wilson, added 19 points. Betty Ricker was high scorer for the rough riders with 12 points.

Benson has a record of 20-2 heading into the girls 4-A State Basketball Tournament at the University of Portland's Childs Center, March 1-5, 1994.

After its biggest win of the season over Benson, Wilson had

a let-down in their game with Cleveland, and loss 60-48 to the Warriors, Camille Adana had a very big night with 25 points and team-mate Julie Grahn added another 24 points. Carla Parker who did not score in the win over Benson, was the Trojans leading scorer with 14 points.

Jefferson ended its P.I.L. season with two wins on their home floor. The first came over Madison 65-32 as Erica Mashia scored 22 points for the Democrats. Christy Novitsky's 19 points led the way for the Senators.

Next up for Jefferson was Franklin, and a 60-42 win over the Quakers. This time it was Stephanie Lincoln, who had been out of action with a bad ankle, scored a game high 20 points for the Demos. Mashia chipping in another 15 points for Franklin.

Cleveland ended its season on a winning note, with a 54-34 victory over Grant on the road. Grahn's 12 points were high for the Warriors, Adana scored 11, Cindy Benton led the Generals in scoring with 13 points.

Lincoln also got two wins in the last week of their season. A 57-37 win over Franklin on the

Cardinals home court. Michelle Lee scored 15 points for Lincoln. McDade again was the leading scorer for the Quakers with 11 points.

The Cardinals closed the season with a 64-41 victory over hapless Grant. Scarlet Chamberlin scored 14 points to lead Lincoln. Lee added another 11 points for the cardinals. Carrie Fraser's 11 points were high for the Generals. Benton scored 10 points for Grant.

Roosevelt made the State playoffs with a 67-30 win over Marshall on the Rough Riders home court. Ricker again was the leading scorer for Roosevelt with 21 points. Billie Williams led Marshall with 10 points.

Madison, a team with only one win all of last season, won for the sixth's time this year, winning 32-30 over Marshall. Novitsky's 9 points were high for the Senators. Williams again led Madison in scoring with 11 points.

Jefferson, Wilson and Roosevelt will try to join Benson at the Child's Center to represent the P.I.L. in the State Tournament, but they must win Sub-Tournament games to get there.

BENSON TAKES LEAD IN P.I.L. RACE!!!

Benson won the big showdown with Wilson on the Techman home court, 65-50. Jason Franklin had a big night when it really counted with 31 points. Point guard Earl Clark helped out with 15 points for Tech Tyron Manlove and Leland Mayes each scored 15 points for the Trojans.

Benson came right back on Friday with a easy 25 point victory over Roosevelt, 85-60. Jeff Naylor's 20 paced the Techman over the Rough Riders. Scott Millage had 15 points and Derrick Ferres 14 points for Roosevelt.

Wilson had a real bad week. After the loss to Benson, they went on the road to take on Cleveland. The Warriors came away with a big upset over the Trojans, 78-68. Leonard Prescott scored 26 points and team-mate Amos Allen added 25 more for

Portland Parks set to hire swim teachers, lifeguards

Portland Parks and Recreation operates programs at 10 outdoor and 6 indoor swim facilities during the summer. They are now hiring qualified staff to fill their 350 positions as lifeguards and swim instructors. The dates of employment are mid-June through late-August. The summer 1994 starting wage for lifeguards is \$5.60 per hour and swim instructors \$6.25 per hour, with experienced employees receiving more.

Training courses for these positions are still available this winter and spring through Portland Parks.

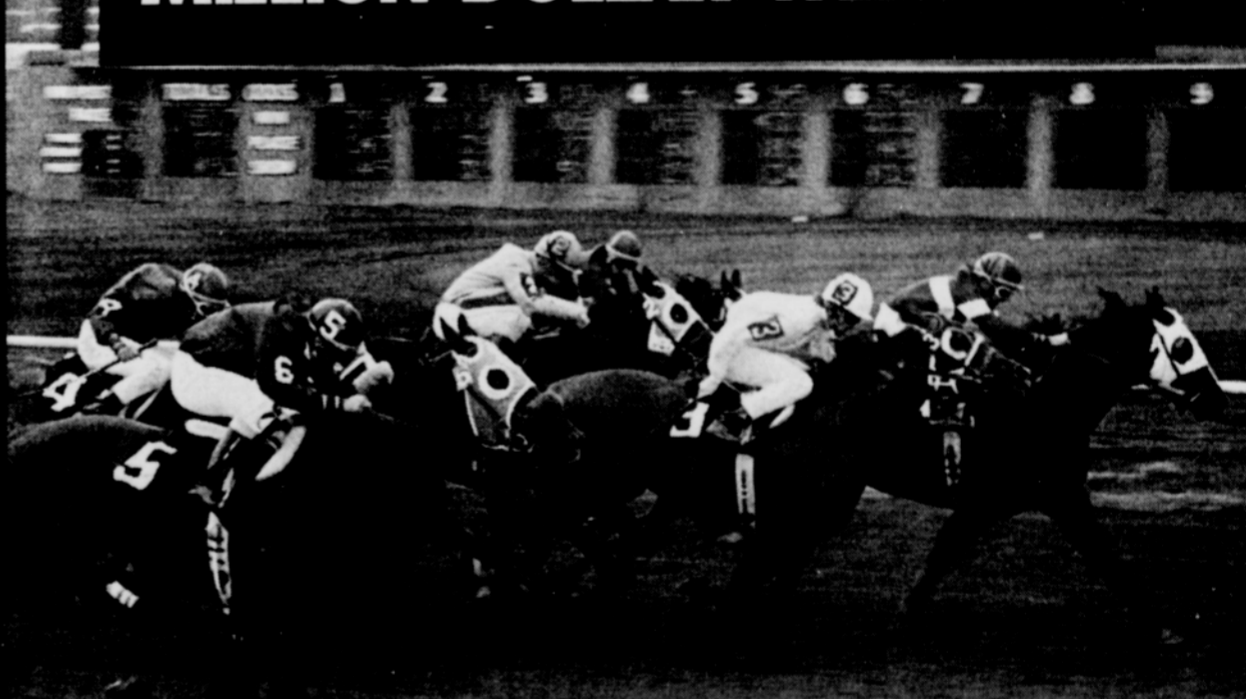
