THERE WERE SO MANY THINGS GOING ON IN THE WORLD OF SPORTS THIS WEEK, THAT IT DIDN'T KNOW WHAT I WOULD WRITE ABOUT SO I WILL WRITE A LITTLE ABOUT A LOT OF THINGS THAT HAPPENED LAST WEEK.

...First it was Portland's own Damon Stoudamire out of Wilson High School, led the Arizona Wildcats to the to the NCAA Basketball Final Four. Damon scored 27 points, 10 rebounds and 7 assists. In the Wildcats 92-72 victory of Missouri. Now Arizona will meet Arkansas in this weekend's semi-finals.

Stoudamire, the Oregon State Boys high school player of the year, had a great game against Missouri. He made 8-14 shots from the field that's including six 3-pointer.

Kenny Warren, the 5'11" off-guard of the Cal-State Bakersfield Roadrunner, that won the NCAA Division II Championship at Springfield, Massachusetts.

Kenny scored 21 points in the Roadrunners 97-86 win over Southern Indiana. It was the second title in two years for Cal-State Bakersfield, the first team to do so in 25 years.

What a Way to make it big, after Division I colleges passed over him, Warren has the last laugh after all. Way to go Kenny! D

...Magic is back! That's right Magic Johnson the all-star guard of the Los Angeles Lakers is back, but not as a player, but as the head coach. After winning five NBA titles with the Lakers, now Johnson will take a young Laker team that will need more than his coaching to win a NBA championship. He will need to add two or three more players to bring the Lakers back to the glory days L.A. fans want back so badly.

Infected in 1991 with the virus that causes AIDS, Johnson retired from the Lakers, Magic came back to play on the USA Dream Team that won a Olympic gold medal. He came out of retirement in 1992 but right before the season started he retired again, this time for good.

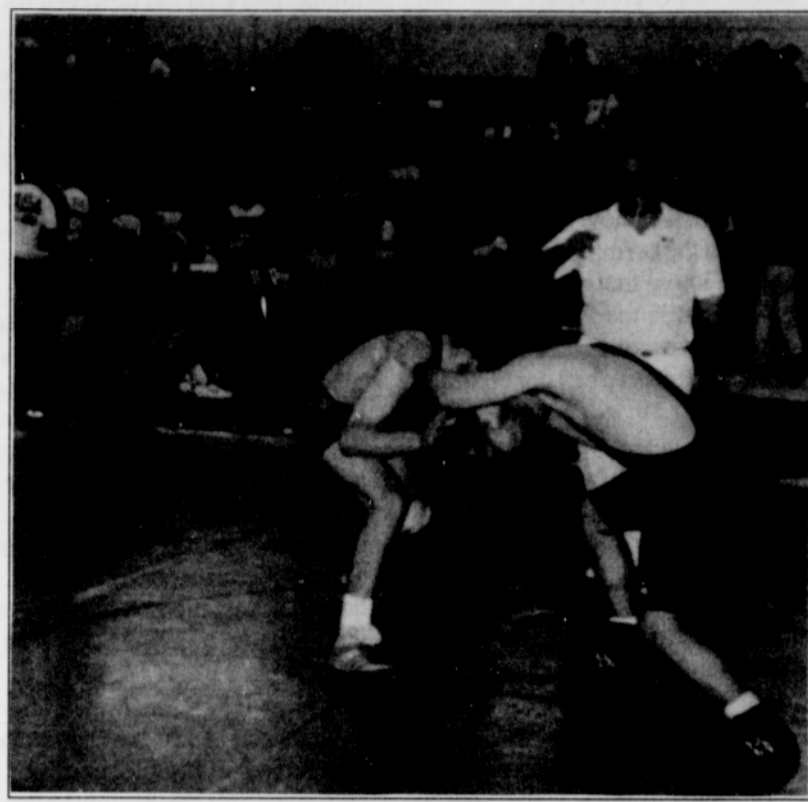

PSU's Urban Music Project Accepting Applications

Portland State University's Urban Music Program was developed in 1992 by ethnomusicologist Stephen Martin; it is accredited through the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

"The program at this point is dedicated to providing high quality, affordable musical instruction in all instruments, at all levels, for all ages in the Portland metropolitan area," says Martin. "These efforts will enhance the livability of our city and encourage young people of all races to develop the full measure of their talents." Martin's dream is to document, study and encourage the diverse ethnic musical culture of the Portland metropolitan area.

Spring term classes and lessons begin April 4. Registration continues from now until the end of the month. "If there's enough interest in a par-

ticular instrument we'll find a teacher," promises Martin.

So far group lessons are available in Indonesian bamboo instruments, clarinet, piano, trumpet, violin, voice, and brass ensemble. Cost is \$65 for half-hour lessons for 10 weeks. A class in Computer Music Technology is also being offered this spring. Enrollment is limited to eight students, who will learn music writing, desktop music publishing and computer midi. Cost is \$100. Also available are 10 weeks of half-hour private lessons, classes in music theory and an ensemble, all for \$165. Call 725-5073 for applications. Some scholarships are available.

Martin received his doctorate in ethnomusicology at University of Washington in 1980, writing his dissertation on "Music in Urban East Africa: A Study of the

Development of Urban Jazz in Dar es Salaam." His musical training included Shona mbira and marimba, Mandinka drumming and dance, Ewe drumming and dance, Afro-American music and jazz, Turkish tanbur, Maridi and Oemar Topo (Javanese gamelan and dance), and piano.

He was on the faculty of University of Alabama from 1986 to 1992 as assistant professor of music, assistant to the director of graduate studies, and director of the Center for the Study of Music in Southern Life. He is the editor of Alabama Folklife: Collected Essays (Alabama Folklife Association, 1989). He has published articles in the Journal of Black Sacred Music, Journal of African Studies, the Journal of the International Library of African Music and in the Black Music Research Journal.

Pioneer Courthouse Square Names Executive Director

After a four-month search process, Pioneer Courthouse Square has announced the selection of Linda Brady Johnson as its new executive director. Johnson, who becomes the third person to hold that position at the Square, began work March 21, 1994.

"We are particularly impressed with Linda's comprehensive experience in management, fund development and visitor destination programs," said Craig Thompson, president of the PCS Board of Directors. "As we begin our next decade, we are pleased to have an outstanding leader to assist us with our vision."

Johnson served as the executive director of Maryhill Museum near Goldendale, Washington, for 8 years and most recently worked as a museum and arts consultant in New York City. During her tenure at Maryhill, large increases in both attendance and funding were achieved. She was responsible for re-creating the celebrated Theatre de la Mode exhibit of 1945 French haute couture manne-

quins which has since traveled to New York, Paris, Tokyo and Portland museums.

Johnson received her bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon and her master's degree from Ohio State University. In addition, she spent a year at the Universitat Tubingen in Tubingen, West Germany.

She has served as officer or board member for several community and professional organizations, including the South Central Washington Tourism board and the Washington Museums Association, of which she was president.

"The past ten years have well established Pioneer Courthouse Square as a nationally known landmark. I am thrilled to accept a leadership role in determining the future of the Square to serve our community, citizens and visitors," stated Johnson.

She will be introduced to the public by Mayor Vera Katz during Pioneer Courthouse Square's tenth-birthday celebration at noon on April 6th.

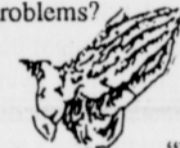
