Union, Contractors Repair Home Wiring Low Income Homes In North Portland

This past Saturday, in low-income homes throughout North Portland and Washington County, unsafe electrical wiring was being replaced and repaired. Electrical lighting was being installed. Outlets and switches were being checked and repaired. Heating needs for elderly and disabled Oregonians were being met. And all at no cost to the home owners.

The electrical contractors of the National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA), Oregon-Columbia Chapter and the electricians of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) Local 48 were providing these services as part of the volunteer efforts of Christmas in April

Christmas in April is a nationwide effort dedicated to providing home repair and rehabilitation to lowincome, elderly and disabled home owners to enable them to live in warmth, safety, independence and dignity. The program provides not only needed electrical work, but a complete range of repair work from roofing to painting to yard clean up. Locally, there are two Christmas

in April Chapters, one in North Portland and a new Chapter in Washington County. This year, 40 homes in North Portland and 17 in Washington County were selected on the basis of their need to receive the donated materials and the labor of more than 700 volunteers, including many members of the building trade unions like IBEW member and volunteer coordinator for the Christmas in April electricians, noted that the most common electrical work the electricians did was to re-wire unsafe switches and sockets, install new lighting both inside the home and outside, and install electrical fans in order to make home owners more comfortable during the upcoming hot summer months.

Electrical Construction Company (EC), an Oregon-Columbia NECA member, provided four trucks which

moved from home to home distribution electrical supplies used by the volunteer Local 48 members.

"Oh, this is just wonderful," said Harriet Clausen, one of the home owners who benefitted form the program. "It's an answer to my prayers."

"This is a completely volunteer effort on the part of our electricians," said Ed Barnes, IBEW Local 48 Business Manager. "We're very proud of the journeymen and apprentices who chose 30th.

to participate in making our North Portland and Washington County neighborhoods more livable."

In addition to skilled trades people from 8 different labor organizations, local businesses and individual volunteers helped with the repairs, including cleaning up, raking yards, and generally making each home a better place to live. Any additional work needed on the homes will be completed next Saturday, April 30th.

PDC is the City's agency for urban renewal, housing and economic development. The home repair loan program is funded through a federal Community Development


Block Grant administered by the Bureau of Community Development.
