Crime Stoppers **Bad checks**

The Beaverton Police Department, Washington County Sheriff's Office, and other law enforcement agencies, in cooperation with Crime Stoppers, are asking for your help in identifying and apprehending two subjects, who have been passing "bad checks" in an area from Portland to Seattle.

On May 10, 1994, two men, one claiming to be 54-year-old Wahid Aly Raafat, with a date of birth of 030340, and the other claiming to be 36-year-old Amir Azdaz Tukladis, with a date of birth of 061658, obtained identification cards form the Washington State Department of Motor Vehicles.

The two men claim to be from Egypt, but there is no record of them having entered the United States under the Raafat or Tukladis names.

The pair used fraudulent documents, showing international driver's licenses, to obtain identification cards from the Oregon DMV. They then surrendered the Oregon ID cards to obtain the ones from Washington.
