Networks Study TV Violence

Does Television Violence Cause Violent Behavior? A University of Oregon professor believes it does and says he's pleased that four television networks-ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox-recently announced plans for a new study on the issue. "There is overwhelming evidence that televised violence makes children who watch it more violent themselves," says Hill Walker associate dean of the UO College of Education. "This desensitizes children to violence and can make them more aggressive." Walker says the networks currently assess violence by tallying individual acts of brutality that appear on the screen. Walker has written a book that examines the increase in violent behavior in public schools. The book, entitled "Antisocial Behavior Patterns in schools: Strategies and Best Practices," will be published in winter of 1994 by Brooks/Cole Publishing.


