# **Portland 'Dreamers' To Return To Whitman College In July**




dream of some day going away to college faces a number of distractions, obstacles and hindrances.

This month, however, about 60 eighth and ninth grade students from northeast Portland are studying on the Whitman College students with both emotional and academic campus during the second phase of a two-year pilot project designed to encourage and inspire their dreams of higher education. Supported by a \$120,000 grant from the Meyer Memorial Trust of Portland, Whitman launched the project a year ago in cooperation with the "I Have A Dream (IHAD)" Foundation in Portland. Fifty-four IHAD students from Portland spent from one week to three weeks on the Whitman campus last July. Many of those students will return to campus this July. As they did last summer, students will live in campus residence halls, take classes in language arts, science, mathematics, music and fine arts, and participate in a variety of field trips, recreational experiences and local community service projects.

or many young people, the graduates will serve as counselors. Two IHAD classroom coordinators will accompany their Portland students to Whitman. About 30 eighth grade students will arrive on campus July 5 and spend two weeks. A second group, about 30 ninth grade students, will arrive for two weeks on July 18.

> The goal of the summer is to provide enrichment. "Many of these young people will be first-generation college students, and we want them to become familiar and comfortable with a college setting," notes Brian Gabbard, one of the program administrators. "We want to bring down the psychological barriers, and while that is very important, we also want this to be a rigorous academic program. We want to help develop their intellectual curiosity and aspirations as well as their confidence in their ability to satisfy those aspirations." In addition to the original grant from Meyer Memorial Trust, additional funding for this summer's project was obtained from three sources. The Oregon Community Foundation and the Rose Tucker Trust of Portland provided \$10,000 each, and the Intel Corp. of Hillsboro, Ore., contributed \$5,000.

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said. "As I have reflected on the program, I have become increasingly convinced that some important intellectual growth happened for several of the kids."

David May, a former Whitman professor of science now teaching at the University of Pittsburgh, noticed that a "marked shift" took place in student attitudes and behavior last summer. "At the end, an overwhelming majority of the 'dreamers' were functioning above the level one would expect of middle school students," May said.

Encouraged by several Whitman alumni in the Portland area, college officials began

### **Oregon Ballet Theatre Offers Dance Instruction To Challenged Children**

regon Ballet Theatre has announced that it will offer a six-week Summer Outreach Workshop for children at risk.

The workshop, to be held July 11 - August 20 at Oregon Ballet Theatre's downtown studios in the North Wing of the Portland Art Museum, is part of the Company's Project FIND ("Find and Inspire New Dancers"). The workshop is made possible in part by a generous grant from US West Communications, facility support from the Portland Art Museum, and a subsidy of instructor time by the School of Oregon Ballet Theatre.

Classes, with instruction by locally and nationally renowned teachers Chisao Hata, Frederic Locke, Jose Molina, Meg Potter, Bruce Smith and Mark Spivak, will be offered in Ballet, Character, Contemporary, Flamenco and African Dance.

Through its community outreach programs, OBT offers on-site education specifically designed to give socio-economically challenged children the opportunity to pursue the study of dance. Project FIND is targeted toward elementary schools with a high percentage of "Chapter 1" and English as a Second Language students, principally schools in north, northeast and southeast Portland. Utilizing local artists, the program provides children with instruction in dance through in-

school, weekly dance classes.

By offering classes in the Company's studios, the children reap the benefits of a facility with proper equipment, including mirrors and ballet barres, to aid them in their dance development. Also, the children are exposed to others their age and are able to observe their technique.

In addition to US West Communications and the Portland Art Museum, OBT's community outreach programs are sponsored by Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Oregon, The Boeing Company, Deluxe Foundation, Jackson Foundation, Kaiser Permanente, PayLess Drug Store, Inc., Portland General Electric, Schnitzer Industries, Sequent Foundation, Washington Mutual Savings Foundation, Weyerhaeuser Company Foundation and Willamette Industries.
