**Skinheads Indicted In Boston**

The founder of a white supremacist skinhead group which advocates using violence and other forms of intimidation to drive Jewish and African American citizens out of the Boston area was indicted for conspiring to violate the rights of Jews and Blacks. Brian Joseph Clayton, 20, and three juveniles are accused of arming themselves with bats, mace, bricks and other weapons and driving on streets and sidewalks looking to blacks to "bash."

**Clinton Honors Distinguished Americans**

President Clinton will award the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, to nine distinguished Americans on Monday. Two of the recipients are African American women. Dorothy Height is the head of the National Council of Negro Women and Barbara Jordan, a congresswoman and professor.

**Oprah Winfrey Stays Number One**

According to the latest Louis Harris poll, Oprah Winfrey is America's favorite talk-show host. She had a popularity rating nearly twice that of the show which came in second place, David Letterman. This is the third consecutive year she has placed first among talk-show hosts.

**Promotor Don King Indicted**

Famed black boxing promoter Don King was indicted in New York City for nine counts of fraud. He is charged with defrauding the Lloyds of London insurance company of over \$350,000 for a fight that never came off. King pleaded not guilty and will go to trial in the fall.

**Sentencing Set For Elders' Son**

An Aug. 29 sentencing date has been set for the son of Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders. Kevin Elders was recently convicted of selling \$275 worth of cocaine to a police undercover officer. He faces a possible life sentence. But the prosecutor says he will seek a 10 year sentence. Elders created a national controversy earlier this year when she suggested that the nation study the legalization of drugs.

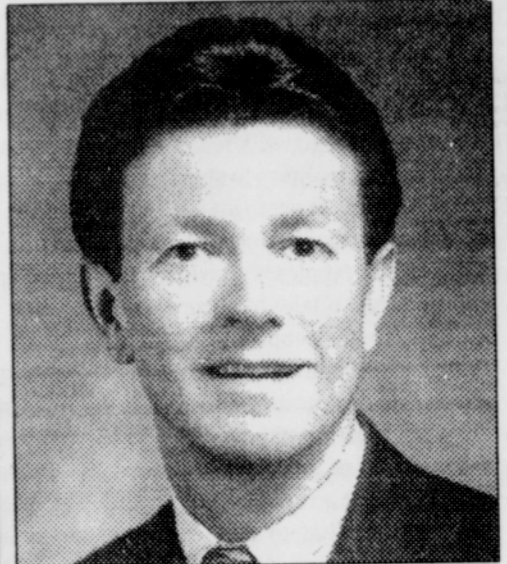
**Study Looks At Domestic Violence**

**Lloyd Mall Hires New Manager**

Walter C. Froman has been named manager of the Lloyd Center shopping mall in Northeast Portland.

Froman, a Portland resident, was manager of Vancouver Mall for five years. A graduate of the University of Oregon, he entered a management trainee program in 1971 with Lipman's in downtown Portland. He advanced through the ranks as assistant buyer, buyer, assistant store manager and store manager. He managed the Washington Square and downtown Portland Frederick & Nelson stores prior to taking over management at Vancouver Mall.

Froman replaced Timothy G. Earnest who was transferred to Lloyd Center's corporate headquarters, MS Management of Indianapolis, Ind. Opened in 1960, Lloyd Center is one of the largest shopping malls in the Pacific Northwest with 1.5 million square feet, providing space for 165 stores. It attracts 15 million visitors annually.

**Neighbors To Paint Boise Homes**

Over a hundred volunteers will work together to paint the homes of five low-income residents of the Boise Neighborhood in inner North Portland.

They will be putting the finishing touches on a summer-long project organized by the Boise Neighborhood Association and Housing Our Families, a non-profit community development corporation.

The Paint-a-Thon is the culmination of the Boise Community Revitalization, Employment and Training Effort, a seven-week program funded by a grant from the Bureau of Housing and Community Development. For the past six weeks, a team of five neighborhood youth have been working with a professional painter to scrape, caulk, sand and prime the houses. Their efforts are part of a training program which include classes at Oregon Outreach's McCoy Academy.

The volunteers on Aug. 13 will come from a wide variety of groups, including neighborhood residents, local businesses, youth programs, fraternal organizations, corporations, and schools. Among those participating are the House of Umoja, Neighbors of Woodcraft, Pacific Power and Light and Tri-Met. The project was also made possible by donations from Miller Paint, Purdy Brush Co., and Plaid Pantry.

**Relief Collected For Rwandans**

**Clothing Bundled For Refugees**

Relief support to Rwandan refugees from the Portland Salvation Army is headed to Africa.

The organization has packaged 12,000 pounds of clothing, about half of it for children, in bails for shipment to Seattle and loading on container ships.

Salvation Army Capt. Samuel Southard said the materials will leave Portland this week.

A relief fund to collect cash donations to purchase food and supplies for the refugees has also started.

This is the second shipment of clothing the Portland Salvation Army has collected from its Oregon outlets, Southard said. In June, another 13,000 pounds of clothing went to Tanzania where the refugees were driven from their homeland torn by war.

There has been more than 60 tons of clothing donated, including more than 75,000 garments, from the Salvation Army's western territory.

Southard said more shipments are possible depending on the amount of contributions still to be received.
