million of the state's general fund and 34 staff positions to operate 50 additional secure close custody beds at MacLaren.



AFL-CIO Applauds Push For Democracy In Haiti

The AFL-CIO, which has spent many years trying to assist the fledgling unions of Haiti, made the following comment on President Clinton's initiative:

Haiti's reign of terror must be brought to an end. Every day brings reports of new atrocities committed by the gangsters who have seized control of that country. Haitian citizens are being terrorized, beaten and murdered. Their institutions, including their democratic trade unions, are being destroyed.

We are particularly outraged at the widespread persecution of trade union leaders in Haiti, including the murder earlier this week of Charles Jean Baptiste, a member of the Judicial Committee of the Teachers Union (CNEH).

The international community has expressed its outrage at the Haitian military's overthrow of a democratically-elected president and its brutal repression of the Haitian people. Though economic sanctions have brought the country to an economic standstill, the dictators in Port-au-Prince care only about maintaining their stranglehold on power.

President Clinton is right to insist that these thugs either relinquish authority or face military action to rescue the Haitian people. Capitulating to the demands of unrepentant killers and accepting their violent rule of a neighboring country would not be in America's best interest.

Behind the resolute leadership of the United States, the international community has the opportunity to restore democracy and the rule of law in Haiti. We continue to hope that the Haitian generals will see the light, depart peacefully and allow Haiti's elected civilian leaders to return. But we are also convinced that only the genuine threat of force offers hope that they will do so.


