On Saturday, December 3, 1994, Boy Scouts at all levels will be combining neighborhoods collecting non-perishable food in their annual Scouting for Food drive held in conjunction with the Oregon Food Bank.

Last year nearly 7,000 Scouts participated, collecting 110,000 pounds of food, enough to feed 8,000 needy families. This year their goal is 300,000 pounds.

Scouts in the 19 counties of Northwest Oregon and Southwest Washington that make up the Cascade Pacific Council, will be knocking on doors between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. All canned goods are welcome, especially nutritious items such as tuna, chunky soups, stews, meats, fruits, and vegetables. Donations of peanut butter, baby formula, and complete packaged meats are also needed.

Boyd's Coffee Company will provide 55,000 collection bags for Scouts to fill and deposit at local fire stations where Oregon Food Bank drivers will collect them.

Bank Of America Introduces Secured Credit Card In Oregon

Bank of America today introduced a secured credit card for consumers with little or no credit history, such as young people and those recently divorced or widowed.

The new BankAmericard Secured Card is available through the bank's 84 branches in Oregon.

The card is secured -- or backed -- by a BofA savings account in an amount equal to the credit line, which can range from \$500 to \$5,000. The principal balance can't be withdrawn while the customer has the card. If a card member fails to repay the debt, the bank collects from the savings account.

"The new BankAmericard Secured Card enables us to meet the credit needs of our customers who may not otherwise qualify for our credit card," said Jim Barri, BofA Oregon vice chairman of Retail Banking. "Once customers build a good credit history or re-establish credit after economic hardship, we hope to graduate them to our classic card."

According to Barri, the card is competitively priced and enables the bank to strengthen customer relationships.

The rate on the new secured card, currently set at 18.15%, is a variable rate, which is adjusted quar-

terly and is based on the prime rate as published in the Wall Street Journal plus 10.9%. The annual fee of \$18 is waived if the customer has a BofA checking account. Accounts have a 25-day grace period on purchases before interest is charged.

To apply for the secured card, customers must be at least 18 years old, have a U.S. address, never have filed for bankruptcy, and all credit accounts must be current. After 18 months of continuously making payments on time, customers will be eligible for a BankAmericard without the required savings deposit.

Rose Bowl To Delay Classes In Eugene

Winter-term classes at the University of Oregon will begin Wednesday, Jan. 4, one day later than originally scheduled, due to concerns over the safety of students returning from the Rose Bowl game in Pasadena, Calif.

The football contest between the UO Ducks and Penn State Nittany Lions takes place on Monday, Jan. 2. Winter-term classes had been scheduled to begin the next day.

UO President Dave Frohnmayer got the approval to delay the start from Joe Cox, chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

"We estimate that one-third of our student body, perhaps 6,000 students, may attend the Rose Bowl and that many of them may be driving home after the game," said Frohnmayer. "To help ensure their safe return, we thought it appropriate to delay the start of winter classes by one day."
