It is quite unusual for the Justice Department to come right out and agree with African-Americans that they are being discriminated against, and to go so far as the file a complaint against a state. With this kind of action from this agency, you know that there must be something really wrong.

If you are a graduate of one of these colleges or universities you might want to contact the Black Caucus in Washington, D.C. to make sure that they stay abreast of what is happening in all of these states as far as the schools are concerned.

The reason why this issues is so important is that there is a need for African-American colleges and universities in this country. If they did not exist there would be thousands of people who would never have gone to undergraduate or graduate school. In other words, they probably would

not have earned a college degree.

With education comes power, if it is property applied. With this you can have control of your life. With education comes economic, and political power, with this you can change things for the better, so always keep

Some African-American colleges and universities will not be affected by this court case. Nevertheless, some states are saying that the reason why they are opposed to all black colleges is that it is reverse discrimination and there should not be discrimination in the educational system.

I don't know what your opinion is about this, but I would say all of this sounds pretty fantastic. Are they really being pragmatic about this situation? I think not. All you have to do is look at some of the schools in the inner-cities throughout the country. Perhaps you can then draw your own conclusions about the state education system.
