

Cocaine Seized In Drugs Arrests

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Special Investigations Unit arrested five people and seized a half kilo of cocaine, \$28,000 in cash, weapons, a vehicle and pagers in a late night arrest last week.

Acting on information obtained from an informant, deputies set up a surveillance at the north end of Clackamas Town Center parking lot in the late hours of Dec. 14.

The deputies witnessed a transaction between two individuals in a white 1983 Ford Thunderbird and other suspects waiting for them

Police said in the course of the transaction, a package containing approximately one and a half kilos of cocaine was exchanged between the suspects.

Some of the suspects were followed to a residence in Vancouver. The Clark and Skamania County Drug Task Force assisted deputies in the investigation.

Arrested were Daniel Richard Moline, 24, Francisco Alberto Alvarez-Sanchez, 34, Adrian Parra Cazaes, 22, Hilario Yanez Zamora, and Jose Estrada Cervantes.

Help Sought In Residential Murder Probe

Police are asking for assistance from the community in the investigation into the murder of James Loupe, 39, who was shot and killed when four suspects, all armed with handguns, entered his residence on the 5700 block of North Interstate. Erin Conoway, 34, was also beaten by the suspects during the Sunday, Dec. 11 evening incident. The couple's twin seven year old boys were present during the crime. The

four suspects stole money, then fled on foot.

Detectives are releasing two drawings of possible suspects in connection with this investigation.

Urban Progress, an inner north/northeast Portland support service that provides 24 hour "safe haven" capability to children and families at-risk of violence and crime.



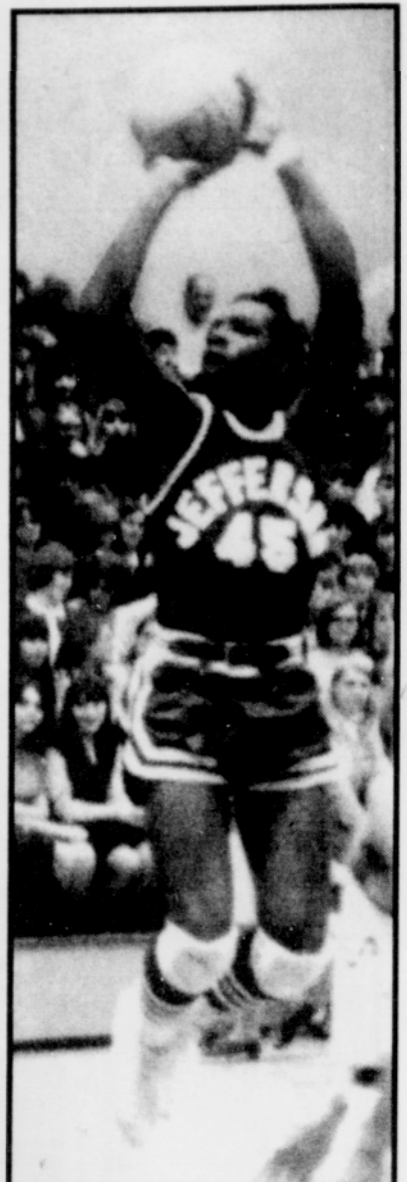
It's Not Always Easy Being Santa

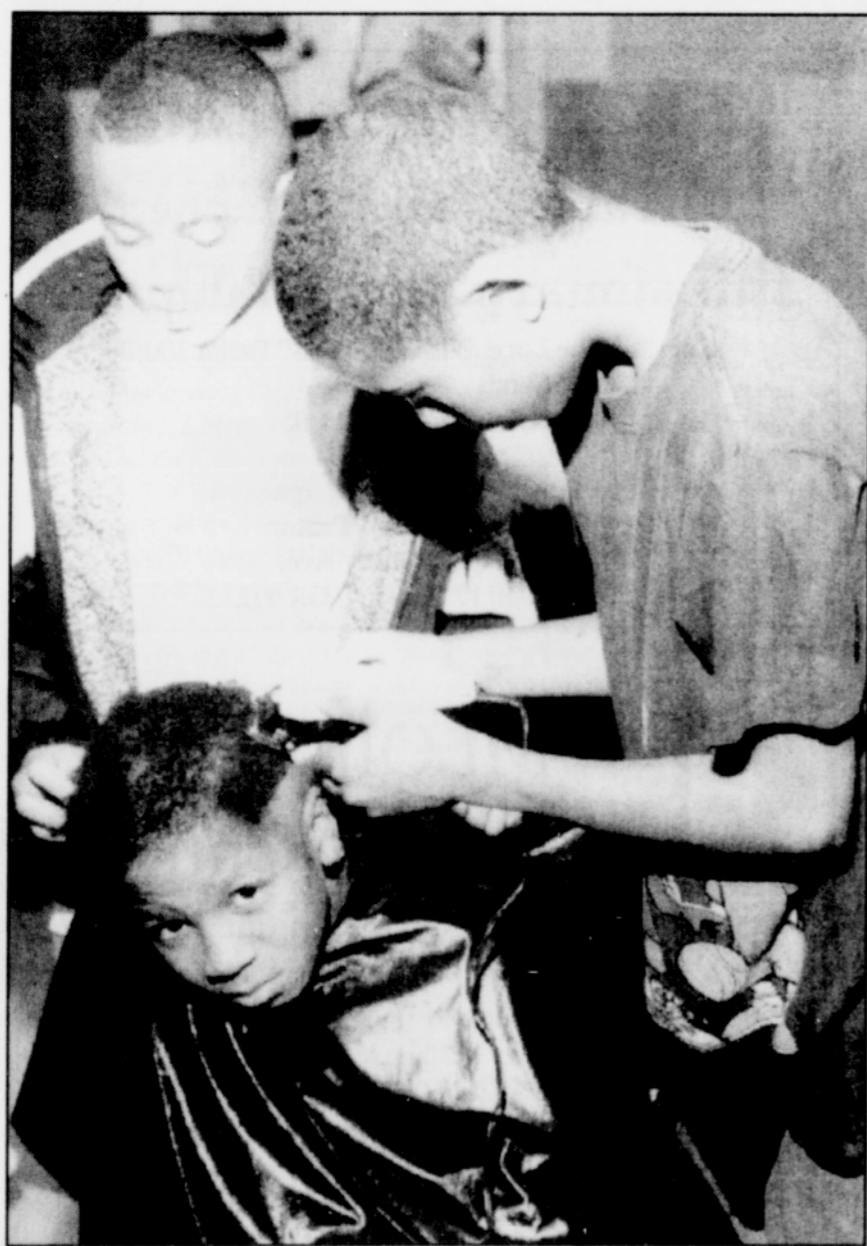
"Oregon's economy is driven by the high-tech industries in the First District," Furse said.
