Randy is healthy, plays well with other children, and can entertain himself rather well. He enjoys playing with animated toys, riding his trike, looking at books, and fishing with his foster dad. This warm, friendly little boy has a contagious smile and a positive outlook on life. His caseworker describes him as having "one of the happiest dispositions of any child I've worked with."

Randy has benefitted from experiences in his nurturing foster family. His grandmotherly foster mom says she would adopt him if she were younger. Randy is ready to move on to a "forever family.

Six-year-old Jorge and fouryear-old Jessica are a brother and sister pair with diverse personalities but an unusually cohesive sibling relationship. They are among 180 Oregon children currently awaiting adoption.

When first removed from an abusive and neglectful home, Jorge was an extremely withdrawn, frightened little boy. Since then, he has developed better self-confidence and has learned many skills. Although on the reserved side, Jorge enjoys cooperative play with other children. He also plays well independently, keeping occupied for hours with his little army men. Jorge likes to be helpful around the home.

Vibrant and outgoing, Jessica can be a non-stop little chatterbox. Jessica likes to play with other children, but has had some difficulties with peers due to her tendency to keep adults well informed of what's going on. Jessica enjoys shopping, dressing up, and playing with Barbie dolls. Like her brother, she enjoys being outdoors and riding a bike.

Intelligent children who learn quickly, Jorge and Jessica are on target academically and developmentally. Both have made tremendous progress in overcoming their past, and will continue to grow and blossom in a patient, nurturing home

Single adults as well as couples are encouraged to consider adopting. Orientation meetings and adoptive parent training classes are offered in several locations.




