Portland Coed Earns Scholarship

United Negro College Fund Announces Contribution

Delores Bridges of Portland was one of four college students who appeared on a "Good News" taping of the Montel Williams Show to discuss the difficulties of financing their college education only to be surprised by UNCF President William H. Gray, III with scholarships.

Aurelio Ibarra, from Paul Quinn College in Dallas, TX, Shana Adams from Xavier University in New Orleans, LA, Angela Goode from Saint Paul's College in Lawrenceville, VA, and Bridges who attends Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta, GA, were stunned by the UNCF awards.

With Montel looking on, Gray presented mock checks to each student. Scholarship funds were provided through grants to UNCF from MBIA Insurance Corp., United Parcel Service (UPS), NYNEX Foundation and Ronald McDonald Children's Charities.

Ibarra is a Mexican-American biology student who wants to become a physician. He received a \$5,000 scholarship from NYNEX.

Goode is in the Single Parents Program at Saint Paul's College. The business administration major is the recipient of a \$10,000 scholarship from MBIA.

Bridges is a business and marketing major. She received a \$5,000 scholarship from UPS.

Ms. Adams, an aspiring physician, received a two-year, full-tuition scholarship for the RMCC/

OLCC Requests Dates Of Proms, Graduations

It's the season for high school proms. And, next month the schedule for high school graduations begins. There may be other activities, celebrations and un-official "skip" days being planned for high school seniors.

"Unfortunately, many of these activities will involve the use of alcohol and may lead to alcohol-related accidents," said Richard Evans, Oregon liquor Control Commission Regulatory Field Services director.

"That's why we are again asking for the dates of the senior events from Oregon's high school principals," Evans said. This is the eighth year that the OLCC has requested the dates of high school celebrations to share with local law enforcement agencies and major hotels.

Evans explained when the OLCC learns of a party involving minors and alcohol, the commission staff will try to stop the party before it starts. "We

inform the sponsors or property owner that Oregon law does not allow anyone but a parent or guardian to make alcoholic liquor available to a minor. The law also clearly states that owners of property where such parties occur are legally responsible and subject to having their property confiscated," Evans said.

The OLCC has also enlisted the cooperation of Oregon beer wholesalers to help prevent keg sales of beer to minors.

The commission requests wholesalers to tell customers about the penalties for furnishing alcohol to minors. The minimum fine for furnishing is \$350. Wholesalers are also asked to report any sale of a large number of kegs to one buyer to the OLCC.
