"I've always liked the idea of taking risks lyrically," explains Skiploader front man Tom Ackerman. "Although at first I was pretty guarded - showing only the side I wanted people to see - I'm now trying to get at what's really there."

Skiploader's debut EP, anxious, restless (Geffen Records) presents Ackerman's soulbaring lyrics couched in driving rhythms and minimalist guitar womp. The Portland, Oregon, quartet - Ackerman, guitarist-vocalist Kevin Higgins,

bassist Craig Koozer, and drummer Jeff Turner -- economically combines intensity with melodic sophistication to produce songs that grab your attention and hold into it.

Skiploader goes a step further. Rather than surrender to formula, the band courts risk by turning against rock convention. They avoid power chords, guitar solos, and other trappings of pop songwriting, in favor of cropped songs that pack intensity and communicate emotion without pandering to the listener. It's terse, it'd edgy, but is it punk?

"I always thought 'punk' meant freedom of expression," Ackerman explains. "Now it's come to be a marketing tool -- some body piercing, some Manic panic, and power chords cranked out in 4/4 time make you a punk band. Punk rock has become the heavy metal of the '90's: a bunch of stupid people dressing funny." Ackerman's principles are a throwback to the bands that have inspired him for years.




