During her visit, Aquino will visit with Kultura Pilipinas, a Philippine-American student group, as well as members of the local and statewide Filipino communities.

Aquino's commencement speech will address democracy in the Philippines. She also will receive an honorary doctorate at the ceremony, the first honorary degree to be bestowed by the university in 49 years. UO President Dave Frohnmayer will confer the honorary degree and president over the commencement.

"We are honored to have a person of Corazon Aquino's stature speak at the university's commencement," says Frohnmayer. "She is a champion for democracy and human rights whose courageous actions have helped make the world a better place.'

Aquino's visit highlights the UO's long association with Asia and the Philippines. Students from the Philippines have studied at the university since 1906.
