Did You Know? BY ROBERT TAYLOR

Did You Know...that the rate at which teenagers and young people are killing themselves has skyrocketed since 1980. The largest increases in suicide have taken place among white girls between 10 and 14 and among young black males in their early twenties. The report from the Centers for Disease Control did not specify any reasons for these trends.

Did You Know...that the state of Alabama recently re-instituted the chain gang as a way to deter crime. The problem is that there is absolutely no evidence that being forced to work on a chain gang makes a person less likely to commit a crime when he gets out of prison.

Did You Know...that new evidence discovered by a team of George Washington University researchers duggests that the type of sophisticated thinking associated with the development of modern society actually began in Africa and not Europe as is widely believed. The researchers conclude that complex thinking began in Africa about 75,000 years ago and not 40,000 years ago in Europe and Asia.

Did You Know...that if you are black and you want to avoid poverty the key things to do include getting a good education, getting married and both husband and wife having jobs. New government studie; show that college educated, married blacks who both work are earning nearly as much as their white counterparts.

Did You Know...that motivational experts strongly suggest that you not speak negatives over your life. In other words, if you are tired, you should not constantly say it. If you do not feel good about yourself, do not say it. They argue that merely repeating negatives constantly can only have the effect of making the situation worse. They suggest that if you are tired constantly, you should instead ask yourself "What constructive action can I take to rid myself of this feeling?"

Did You Know...that according to the latest government reports, the rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer in America. Labor Secretary Robert Reich reported last week that "virtually all" of the increase in average family income since 1978 has gone to the top 20% of the population while the bottom 20% has actually lost 15% of its average family income.

Did You Know...that if you want a guide on how best to repair negative credit, you can order (\$9.95) a good one - Credit Repair Made Easy - from the Better Life Club, P.O. Box 28422, Washington, D.C. 20038.
