John Medeski, Billy Martin & Chris Wood

Pianist/organist John Medeski grew up in Florida, where he bagan formal musical training at age five. By his high school years, he'd worked with Jaco Pastorius and Mark Murphy, in addition to performing frequently with other local and national musical luminaries. In 1983, he studied at the New England Conservatory with Ran Blake, Leonard Shure and Bob Moses. During the mid-eighties, in addition to his for-

mal musical studies, he gained invaluable experience working as a sideman in the Boston area with performers such as Dewey Redman, Billy Higgins, Bob Mintzer and Alan Dawson, and New England blues legend Mr. Jellybelly, who first encouraged Medeski to explore the complexities and wonders of the B-3 organ. At this time he also served as pianist/organist for jazz groups the Either/Orchestra, Mandala Octet and

the Chris Hollyday Quartet. In 1991, he moved to New York City and has since worked with dozens of "downtown" musical groups and performers, including Reggie Workman, John Lurie's Lounge Lizards, John Zorn's Masada Group and Oren Bloedow. The year 1994 has seen the release of Medeski's second Gramavision album entitled Lunar Crush, an "avantrock-jazz-hop" collaboration with virtuoso guitarist David "Fuze"

Fiuczynski that was voted one of the "Best Jazz Alums of 1994" by the Village Voice. In addition to his performance on David Byrne's 1994 self-titled release, Medeski, along with musical partners Martin and Wood, also participated on arranger Ken Schaphorst's upcoming Accurate Records album, When The Moon

Drummer/percussionist Billy Martin was born in New York City, the son of a former Radio City Rockette and a violinist with the New York City Ballet and the New York City Opera Orchestra. As a child, he studied privately with several professional drummers including Joe Morello, Michael Carvin and Latin percussion master, Frankie Malabe. In 1984 and 1985, Martin's percussion interests had turned heavily toward Caribbean, Latin and other African-based rhythms, and he dove head-first into New York's Brazilian music scene, performing with several groups, including Pe De Boi. During this time, Billy also began a long association with drummer, percussionist and composer extraordinary Bob Moses, performing on his Gramavision albums, A Visit With the Great Spirit (1984), The Story Of Moses (1987) and Time Stood Still

(1994), as well as a late-eighties European release of the duo's Drumming Birds collaborations. In 1985, Billy joined Chuck Mangione's group, gaining valuable performance experience as he toured with the group over the next three years. After moving on from Mangione's group in 1988, he situated himself in Brooklyn, quickly immersing himself in New York's burgeoning "downtown" music scene, performing, touring and recording with groups that included Samm Bennett's Chunk, the Ned Rothenberg Double Band and an important stint serving from 1991-94 as percussionist for John Lurie's Lounge Lizards. In addition to Martin's participation in Medeski, Martin & Wood, he is also a drummer for John Zorn's Masada group and a member of the John Lurie National Orchestra (a trio with saxophonist Lurie and Calvin Weston), with whom he recently toured Europe and Japan and can also be seen performing with in the upcoming major motion picture, "Blue in the Face."

While growing up in Colorado, bassist Chris Wood studied jazz and classical bass, as well as musical composition. He performed professionally in Denver while in his teens, and in 1989, moved to Boston to

study at the New England Conservatory, where he studied with Dave Holland, Geri Allen and Bob Moses. During this time, he also worked as a sideman for some of the area's top jazz talents, including Bob Moses, George Russel, Steve Kuhn, Joann Brackeen, Randy Weston, the Either/Orchestra and the Ken Schaphorst Big Band. In 1991, Chris moved to New York City, where his unique approach, versatility and wide-ranging influences made him an in-demand player on the "downtown" music scene, performing and/ or touring with among others, Marc Ribot, Ned Rothenberg, John Zorn, Jack Walrath, the Jazz Passengers, Elliot Sharp, Samm Bennett's band Chunk, and Oren Bleodow. Aside from his duties with Medeski, Martin & Wood, Chris is also a member of Marc Ribot's Shrek group, with whom he also tours and records. Wood is featured on Shrek's 1994 self-titled Avant release, as well as another 1994 Avant project, Rough Assemblage's Construction And Demolition, performing works by composer Norman Yamata. He can also be heard on the Ned Rothenberg Double Band's release Real And Imagined Time (Moers Music), which will be released in January of 1995.






The Glass Shield.
