

Observing Kaiser To Build Vancouver Clinic

At a recent ground breaking ceremony, Kaiser Permanente announced the beginning of construction on a medical and dental office building in the Salmon Creek area of north Clark County.

The property is near the intersections of Northeast 20th Avenue and 144th, and I-5 and I-205.

"Throughout the 50 years we've been in Clark County, our program has grown and adapted to the changing needs of our members," said Michael Katcher, Kaiser Permanente regional manager. "We're bringing this new outpatient medical and dental facility to north Clark County to keep pace with the growth in the area and to give our members convenient access to the services they use most often."

Medical services provided at the facility and include primary care and some specialty care, as well as X-ray, pharmacy, laboratory and optical. "We've designed this building to hold a range of health care services under one roof," said Dr. Allen Weiland, Kaiser regional medical director and a resident of Clark County. "The flexible design will allow us to add services as needed."

Kaiser Permanente Dental Director Donald Prasnarik said plans call for closing the Hazel Dell Dental Office, which Kaiser leases and move services to the Salmon Creek

will continue to operate as well. "The Salmon Creek facility will be double the size of our current Hazel Dell Dental Office. This will allow us to continue to offer general dentistry services as well as begin to add specialty services."

The Cascade Park Dental Office in east Vancouver will remain open. Kaiser's Vancouver Medical Office and Cascade Park Medical Office

The new building is scheduled to open in the fall of 1996. Total project cost is \$20. Anderson Construction is the general contractor for the two-story, 82,000 square-foot facility and a 500-space parking lot.

About 75,000 Clark County residents use Kaiser medical care services and 25,000 use dental care services.

The City of Portland and the Portland Development Commission will hold a meeting outlining contracting opportunities in the River District on Wednesday, Oct. 25 from 5-6:30 p.m. at Albers Mill. Albers Mill at 1200 N.W. Front. There is free parking adjacent to the building.

The River District Development Plan anticipates more than \$100 million in public investment and more than \$750 million in private investment over the next twenty years. In the next 12 months, the contracting process will begin for a number of public improvements. The City and PDC are committed to encouraging the participation of minority, women and small construction firms in this process.

Contractors attending the meeting will be able to meet representatives of four to five city bureaus, representatives from the State of Oregon and private developers—all of whom have pending projects in the River District.

Buy 2 bags now, freeze one.

- 1 1/2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
- 2 tablespoons oil
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar

Preheat oven to 150°. Coat an 8" x 8" x 1 1/2" loaf pan. Combine sugar, eggs and oil in a medium mixing bowl. Add cranberries and flour. Mix ingredients on medium. Stir in cranberries and add sugar. Business Loan Program Opens

The city's Bureau of Housing and Community Development and the Portland Development Commission (PDC) have established a \$50,000 pilot program designed to assist selected small businesses located in inner North/Northeast Portland. The loan program offers flexible financing terms and intensive technical assistance to businesses that have the desire and capability to expand their operations.

Participating sponsors in the program along with the City and PDC are the Small Business Development Center, the PSU Business Outreach Program, The Bank of Newport, and the Bank of America.

Called the Targeted Microbusiness Incentive Program, it is targeted to businesses that either operate out of a residence, or have been in operation for less than 18

months. Eligible businesses must be located with the King, Vernon, Humboldt, Bosie, Eilot, and Sabin neighborhoods. Low-or moderate-income business owners are eligible as are those whose expansion will lead to the creation of full-time, permanent jobs.

The key objectives of the program are to foster good business relationships between the businesses and banks, particularly where there has not been the opportunity for such relationships due to business size and credit issues.

To enhance and enrich the borrower's business management experience through intense technical assistance; and to assess the potential for public lending programs to meet the needs of microbusinesses when conventional financing is not an option.

The Microbusiness Incentive Program is a one-year pilot program which may be repeated if it is successful. Funds for the program come in the form of federal Community Development Block Grant dollars. Applicants for the program will participate in an individual needs assessment to determine what loan amount the business qualifies for.

Saving Energy Costs

Check heating system filters and replace if needed. Filters cost as little as \$1.
